City Police Court.

The court-room was filled this morning with parties anxious to hear of the great Sheffield street Christmas Day irregularity.

The other business was unimportant, there being only one case of drunkenness to be disposed of.

Maurice McKay was arrested drunk in Union street.

"He didn't know he was drunk but somebody told him so," the Magistrate, in order that he would know next time, fined him \$5, or in default two months in the penitentiary.

Herman Buchholz, a German youth just let out of the hospital, went to the Station for protection. He is still ill, and was sent to the Alms House, as he had no home.

Michael Doyle, Michael Rogers, Samuel Claxton and Thomas Robson, the four prisoners charged with breaking the windows of William Smedley's school in Sibley street, were called up, and each pleaded not guilty to the charge.

There were three lawyers engaged in this very interesting case. A. W. Beard, Esq., appeared for the prosecution and John Kerr and R. J. Ritchie, Esqrs., appeared for the prisoners. At the request of Mr. Kerr the witnesses in the case were sent out of court.

They were nearly all colored men. None of them seemed to relish assembling and keeping together with the fun, as much as to testify, and were much disappointed. Mrs. Sadler was first called. She is the wife of the prosecutor, and was on the stand over an hour.

She swore the young men went into her school, wanted something to eat, and as she would not supply their wants, raised a row with the men in the house. The lamps were put out, chairs, stoves and other furniture broken, and then the prisoners went outside and broke the windows of William Smedley's school in Sibley street. A friend saved her fowl, and the rowdies did not get the "scold"; they expected Mr. Sadler to be a great talker, and amuse d the Court by the masterly manner in which she related the case of at least two of the prisoners, and the Magistrate thought, at the conclusion of her testimony, he saw a more serious offence, and said he should remand the prisoners until Friday, and then have them tried for each offence, and keeping together with intent to create a riot. Mr. Kerr and Mr. Ritchie objected to this, as only one witness had been heard. They stated they could prove a perfect alibi in the case of at least two of the prisoners, and the Magistrate allowed the trial to go on.

Portland Police Court. Samuel Baker was charged with assaulting W. J. Campbell, and the charge being proven, a fine of \$8 with \$1.50 costs was imposed.

Patrick Rogers, another fighting man, was found guilty of assaulting Samuel Short. The same fine was imposed on him.

Daniel McCaffery was called upon to answer the charge of snow-balling Elizabeth Johnson. The charge was withdrawn.
