**NEW REFINING PROCESS  
FOUND**

Lower Cost Method for Electro-  
lytic Refining of Copper

Evolved

A process by which copper can be  
refined at a cost much lower than  
that attained under present methods  
has been evolved in British Colum-  
bia, according to an article written  
by John F. McConnell, describing the  
work being carried on in a demon-  
stration plant in Vancouver. By this  
method electrolytic copper can be  
secured in an operation that is com-  
pleted within twenty-four hours. It  
is claimed that not less than 85 per  
cent. of the copper content of the  
most refractory ores can be recov-  
ered, and that the cost amounts to  
only seven cents a pound. The op-  
eration of a small plant is nearly as  
economical as a larger one, thus op-  
ening up large possibilities in the  
operation of small mines.

In the demonstration plant there  
are two wooden tanks and a small  
power plant which operates an air  
pump used to maintain pressure in  
an air compressor and to transform  
the electricity to charge the anodes  
and cathodes of the electrical pre-  
cipitation tanks. A roasting fur-  
nace forms part of the equipment, be-  
ing used for the treatment of sul-  
phide ores in order to drive off the  
sulphur sulphur content. The sul-  
phur fumes are driven off and trapped  
for conversion to sulphuric acid. The  
sulphuric is the principal solvent  
for the electrolytic process.

**Economical Recovery of Copper**

Two British metallurgical engi-  
neers are the inventors of the process,  
and patents have been taken out in  
all important countries. A great sav-  
ing in cost of plant, and consequently  
a cheaper cost of refining, is the big  
advantage of the new method. The  
agitation by jets of air of the solu-  
tion of sulphuric acid and other chem-  
icals in which the crushed ore is  
placed enables a great saving of time.  
After being exposed to the solvent for  
some time, the muddy solution is si-  
phoned into a second tank by an auto-  
matic process, and the particles are  
exposed to the electrically charged  
cathodes and anodes. A continuous  
siphoning process from one tank to  
the other is maintained until the en-  
tire recovery is accomplished.

The cost of a fifty-ton plant is  
placed at between \$25,000 and \$30,-  
000, and can be located at individual  
mines, thus eliminating extra cost  
of transportation of ore to the  
smelter. The advantage to the small  
operator, and particularly for com-  
panies mining refractory ores, is be-  
lieved to be greatest. The decision  
to prevent a monopoly of this meth-  
od being secured by any one producer  
will mean that the process will be  
generally available, and that the  
small producer can operate to better  
advantage than under previous con-  
ditions.

**CHATHAM CITY COUNCIL URGES  
ELECTRIFICATION OF  
OF PERE MARQUETTE**

Chatham April 21—At the regular  
meeting to-night the City Council,  
on motion of Ald. Briscoe passed a  
resolution endorsing Sir Adam Beck's  
plan for electrification of the Pere  
Marquette Railway.

A deputation from the G.W.V.A.  
urged the Council to take action in  
adopting the housing scheme of the  
Government so as to overcome the  
great shortage of houses for work-  
men and returned soldiers.

It is expected the scheme will be  
submitted to a vote of the ratepayers  
shortly.

**DENIAL OF REPORT IS RECEIVED AT PARIS**

Paris April 21—The naval port of  
Sebastopol in the Crimea has not been  
occupied by Russian Soviet troops ac-  
cording to a dispatch to the Journal  
des Debats, dated Sunday at Saloniki.  
The dispatch says that fighting ap-  
pears to have stopped for the time  
being in the Southern Crimea. The  
Bolsheviks are said to be shunning  
their advance in the face of the allied  
artillery fire.

A Russian wireless message received  
in London on Sunday night said that  
Sebastopol was said to be in the hands  
of the revolutionary committee. The  
Russian message further added that  
after negotiations with the allied com-  
mand, an agreement had been reached  
for an armistice of eight days to ex-  
pire on April 25.

Fighting in North.  
London April 21—Twenty-eight  
Bolsheviks including one officer, were  
captured by allied troops in the raid at  
Sebastopol on the Kerch front, south-  
east of Arhangel on April 13, an of-  
ficial statement from the British war  
office to-day says. Many of the enemy  
were killed and several sleds loaded  
with wounded were seen moving away  
from the scene of the fight.

**SUPREME ECONOMIC COUNCIL  
TO DISCUSS QUESTIONS  
IN REGARD TO SUP-  
PLYING GERMANY**

PARIS, April 21.—The supreme  
economic council will meet to-morrow  
to consider proposals to grant a limited  
supply of raw materials, notably  
cotton, to Germany to enable the fac-  
tories there to start work and to re-  
lieve the unemployment, which is said  
to be at the bottom of much of the  
disorder in Germany.

The Council, it is said, also will re-  
vise regulations for German exports  
required to pay for food imports and  
probably will discuss the new econo-  
mic situation created by the slacken-  
ing of the blockade regulations as ap-  
plied to Germany's neutral neighbors.

After April 25 goods and commodi-  
ties may be shipped to the neutral  
countries adjoining Germany virtually  
without restriction, the neutrals them-  
selves assuming responsibility for the
