A mass meeting was held in Woodstock last night to discuss the housing bylaw as adopted by the City Council. The bylaw was fully explained by Mayor Gahagan and others of the Council. Many requests have been received from citizens who wish to avail themselves of the Government's plan, and it is predicted many returned soldiers and others will take the chance to secure a home at the nominal cost of construction.

The Commission appointed to represent the Ontario Government locally in carrying out the details of the plan is composed of Mayor A. J. Gahagan, Ben. Gale, and R. W. McPherson of the Crown Lumber Company. They will receive a salary for their work in connection with the Commission, which may be authorized by the Council at a later date, this point being embodied in the bylaw.

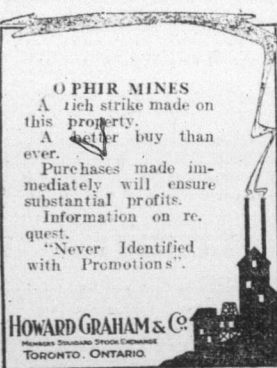
