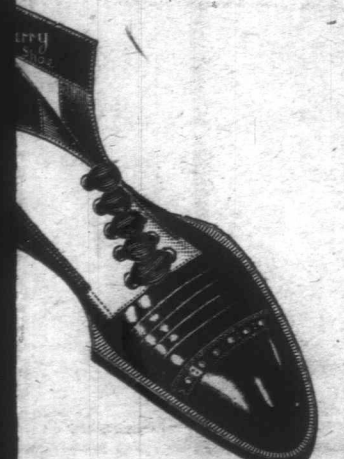

INCREASED ACREAGE UNDER FARM CROPS

Official Returns Show Largely Increased Acreage Under Crops of all Kinds—Oats Acreage Has Increased Over 45 Per Cent.

Official returns of the Saskatchewan Department of Agriculture based on returns from correspondents in all parts of the province, indicate the acreage sown in wheat this year to be 2,374,058, as compared with an estimated acreage of 2,047,724 at this time last year, an increase of 826,334 or 40 per cent.
The acreage of oats is 1,170,452 as compared with the estimated acreage of 801,810 at this time last year. This is an increase of 368,642 or 46 per cent.
The acreage in flax is 141,451, as compared with an acreage of 128,528 at this time last year, the increase being 12,923 or ten per cent.
The total area under the four principal grains is 3,786,984 acres compared with an estimated acreage last year of 3,057,461, the increase being 729,523, or 24 per cent.
Last year the final returns showed the grain area harvested to be about 140,000 acres less than the area sown in the spring, indicating a large proportion abandoned. A comparison of this year's estimates with the area

actually covered by threshing operations last fall will, therefore, be more accurate, seeing that there is very little probability of any grain being abandoned by harvesters this year.
The wheat crop shows a gain of 462,959 acres, or 23 per cent, as compared with the final acreage of 1907. The oat crop shows a gain of 426,265 acres or 57 per cent. Barley shows a gain of 23,418 acres or 31 per cent, and flax a gain of 16,423 or 18 per cent. On the same basis the total acreage under the four principal grains shows a gain of 849,550 acres or 30 per cent. An even advance of 24 per cent as shown by a comparison with the early estimates of last year, may be interpreted as meaning a wide extension of agricultural activity in this province.
The combined acreage of wheat for Manitoba and Saskatchewan according to official estimates is 5,224,680, as compared with the final return of 4,760,482 for 1907, an increase of 464,049 or ten per cent. The combined area under all grains according to the same estimate is 8,596,737 acres, compared with the final return of 7,255,918 last year, an increase of 971,819, or 13 per cent.

ARCHITECTS WANT DAMAGES

Local Architects Claim Damages from City for Next Fulfilling Agreement.

The city council is up against it in many ways these days. The sewerage and water connections is one proposition, the financial situation is another, suit for land claimed to be sold by them and which was not their property, etc., etc.
The latest difficulty that seems to have come up is with the local architects. Some time ago the health department called for competitive plans for a new \$100,000 hospital. The architects of the city submitted plans and the committee could not come to a decision as to what three they should select from the rest from which one was to be chosen. Finally it was decided to accept none of them, and the architects were notified that the committee intended to hold another competition and asked them to withdraw the designs they had submitted. The architects refused to put in new plans and have threatened the city with suit for damages to the extent of \$40,000 for the city not carrying out its agreement with regard to the first competition arranged for.
F. W. G. Haultain, K.C., city solicitor is advising the city while the architects have secured the services of Mackenzie, Brown, Thom & Frame to act in their behalf.

FARMERS' EXCURSIONS

Government Will Again Conduct Excursions to the Experimental Farm.

The provincial department of agriculture, encouraged by the success that has attended their efforts in past years, has again arranged for excursions to the Indian Head Experimental Farm. On July 29th, special excursion trains will leave Antler on the Arcoia line; Fleming on the C.P.R. main line and Prince Albert; and on July 30th, special excursion trains will leave Caron or Mortlach on the C.P.R. main line and Gainsboro, via Estevan and Moose Jaw.
A rate of approximately one cent per mile has been secured. Return tickets from points on the C.N.R. main line to Warman will be sold at single fare on the regular passenger trains connecting with the special excursion trains on the Prince Albert-Regina line.
Persons taking advantage of this rate may purchase excursion tickets to Indian Head at Warman.
The excursion trains are somewhat later than they have been in past years and this together with the fact of the early season will bring them at a time when the experimental farm will be at its best. The crops of Mackenzie, Brown, Thom & Frame are already looking strong and healthy and by the last of July, should be well advanced. The experimental plots have made a good start and should present many object lessons to the excursionists. The hedges, windbreaks and shrubbery show what may be accomplished in a few years on an open prairie farm, while the orchard and garden suggest something of the agricultural possibilities of our province. These excursions present an opportunity seldom afforded for visiting the experimental farm and seeing what has actually been accomplished by intelligent effort on the open prairie.
Detailed information giving the time of departure of trains and rate schedule will be given at a later date.

SUDDEN DEATH

Of a Govan Farmer at Palmer House Last Night—Inquest to be Held.

Shortly after nine o'clock last evening the clerk of the Palmer House noticed one of his guests, who was sitting in the reading room, looking ill. The clerk went to give him assistance and called in medical men, but before they arrived he had succumbed. Dr. Seymour and Dr. Bell, who came in answer to the call, decided that an inquest was necessary, and one will be held. The remains were removed to Wright Bros. undertaking parlors.
The deceased man's name was George Green and he had registered at the hotel last evening. He is a farmer about 35 years of age, and his land is in the Govan district.
On his person was found medicine and a prescription, and it is believed he was under medical care for heart disease.
