C A P. XXXIV.

An Act to explain an Act for the Settlement of the Boundaries between the Provinces of Canada and New Brunswick. [10th August 1857.]

HEREAS by an Act passed in the Fifteenth Year of the Reign of Her Majesty, intituled An Act for the Settle- 14&15 Vict. ment of the Boundaries of the Provinces of Canada and New Brunswick, it is provided that New Brunswick shall be bounded as is mentioned in a certain Award made by Stephen Lushington, Judge of the Admiralty Court, and Travers Twiss, Doctor of Laws, which Award, as recited in the said Act, declares (among other things) that New Brunswick shall be bounded from a meridional Line therein described along the Forty-eighth Parallel of Latitude "to the Mistouche River, and thence down the Centre of " that Stream to the Restigouche, the Islands in the said River " Mistouche and Restigouche to the Mouth of the latter River at " Dalhousie being given to New Brunswick:" And whereas certain Doubts have arisen respecting the true Meaning of the said Award in the Parts above recited: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same:
