unless a special permit is obtained from the Department of Lands and Forests.

A wise policy, is "leave and let live," as human contact could make an animal one of nature's untouchables.

Anti Weed By-Law Proves Hazardous

that was the question which gave members of Toronto Township Council's general committee cause for concern last week.

Bob Holmes, the town-ship's weed inspector explained that the weed problem in this municipality has made his job rather hazardous at times. "He's a real dangerman,"

Reeve Robert Speck remarked with a grin. "The way some people react to the anti-weed bylaw, our Mr. could and up being shot."

Councillor Roy McMillan stated that it could be a two or three year fight to clean up the weed problem here because *Toronto Township

seems to be the only municipality concerned about weed control.

The committee agreed that the weeds on township-owned property should be cut if possible, or sprayed "with caution" where cutting is not possible.

Mr. Holmes told the committee that there may be a "test case" in court soon over the anti-weed bylaw.

Councillor Cam Pickell asked what affect the spraying of weeds in the Rattray would have. He was told that a weed spray program is due there soon and that it could force the birds to move on when the food supply is cut. Nevertheless, the job must be done!
