If you tell your mother you are going to a friend's house and then change your mind, have the courtesy to call her. Consideration doesn't cost a cent, but proves you are mature. And that's all your mother really wants to know, that you are mature. Just read the papers and you'll understand why your mother is uptight. It can happen to you.
