Western farmers must face this issue. Great Britain, by such instruments as the British-Argentine Trade Treaty of 1929 has demonstrated that she can obtain wheat from countries that will accept British manufactured goods in return.

From the point of view of the west it does not watter if Great Britain does or does not extend a preference to Canada. What does matter is that Canada should enlarge imports from Great Britain.

That is the issue in the present campaign.

One party, the Liberal party, is pledged to the maintenace and extension of the preference.

The other party, the Conservative party, is pledged to the destruction of the British preference as it now exists and to its supplanting by a trade agreement under which no British goods which might be manufactured in Canada would be permitted to enter this Dominion.

The electors must choose as between the two.
