

The Volcano-Vesuvius. Signor Matteucci, who has been studying Vesuvius for many years, made a report on the tivity of the volcano. From July, 1895, it kept constantly in action for more than four years, the flow of lava ceasing in September, 1899.
The depth of the crater was then over 600 feet. Last April the lava rose to within 240 feet of the top, when a series of explosions within the centre began. Some blocks of lava were projected 1,800 feet perpendicularly into the air. One block weighed thirty tons, and Signor Matteucci estimated that it took 610,000 horse power to eject it. Five hundred thousand cubic yards of lava and ashes were belched forth in April and May. The crater is thirty feet higher than before, so that Vesuvius rises now 4,300 feet

above sea level. Cream of Peasut Soup. To make cream of peanut soup put half a pint of peanut butter into a quart of milk; add half a teaspoonful of salt, a dash of pepper, a table spoonful of grated onion, a bay leaf, a saltspoonful of celery seed, or a little chopped celery tops. Cook this in a double boiler for ten minutes. Moisten one tablespoonful of corn-starch in a little cold milk, add it to the hot milk, and stir until smooth and thick. Strain through a fine sieve, and serve with squares of toasted whole wheat bread. Nuts are sufficiently oily without adding but-ter. 'Any nut or mixture of nuts may be used in the same manner. — Ladies' Home Journal.
