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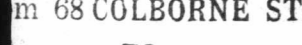

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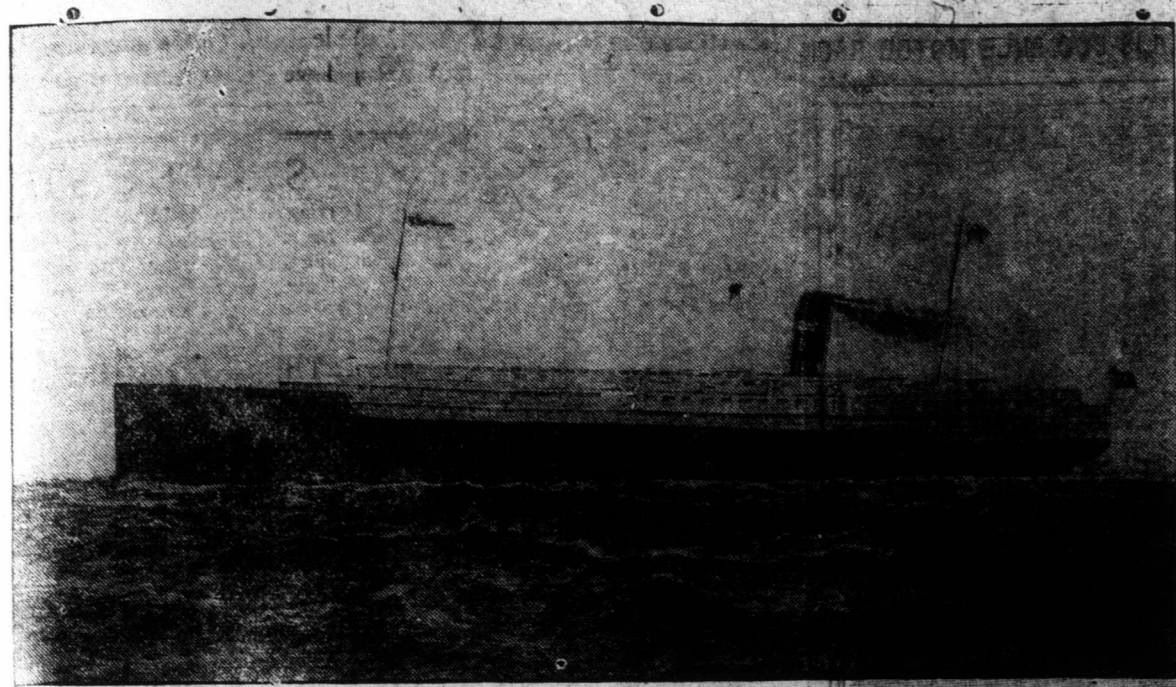
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Laughing of the Steamer "Noronic"



On June 2nd there was launched in the yards of the Western Dry Dock & Ship Building Co., Limited, Port Arthur, a passenger steamer, building for the Northern Navigation Co., Limited (Grand Trunk Route). This vessel when completed will be the largest and finest passenger vessel on the Great Lakes, every improvement known in modern shipbuilding is embodied in the design, and the best materials obtainable used in her construction. She is 100 ft. long between Sarnia, Sault Ste. Marie, Port Arthur, Fort William and Duluth, connecting at Port Arthur and Port William with the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway for all points in Western Canada, and taking her place as flagship of the fleet that will run the lake and rail route between the East and the West. The principal dimensions of the hull are as follows:—

Length over all 350 ft. 0 in.
Length between perpendiculars 302 ft. 0 in.
Breadth moulded 52 ft. 0 in.
Depth moulded 28 ft. 0 in.

The hull is built on what is known as the I-sherwood system of longitudinal framing. The frames, instead of being run fore and aft or longitudinal, and are supported by large plate web frames, fitted transversely, spaced to feet apart. This construction is very much stronger than the ordinary system, at the same time being lighter, thus gaining in carrying capacity and speed. A double bottom of 4 ft. 9 in. deep, extending the full length of the vessel, and divided by eight water-tight transverse bulkheads into nine compartments. Two collision bulkheads are fitted forward, making her practically unsinkable.

There are six decks, all being made of steel, named as follows:— Main deck, Spar deck, Promenade deck, Observation deck, Boat deck and Hurricane deck. The entrance hall or lobby is on the main deck, the side walls are panelled with quartered oak, interlocking rubber tiling floors. The main stairway leads to the social hall on Spar deck, and the office is located on the port side. This office is to be fitted similar to the office of a large hotel, where clerks will be on duty at all times. There are one hundred and fifty-one staterooms on this deck, and it is well equipped with toilet rooms, bath rooms, barber shop, etc. The main corridors of the spar deck are finished in white enamel, with the social hall panelled in quartered oak. The next deck is the promenade deck, which is panelled throughout in mahogany. At the forward end is a drawing room, fitted with comfortable lounges, upholstered in English leather. Aft of the drawing room are ten en suite cabins, furnished in mahogany. These rooms are fitted with brass beds and each has a private bath room adjoining, finished in white tiling. The smoking room is at the after end and is finished in fumed oak. Seventy ordinary staterooms are on this deck. There is a wide promenade extending completely around the vessel, similar to other vessels of this line, and which has proved to be very popular with the passengers. The distance around is about eight hundred and eighty feet, or six laps to the mile.

The next deck is known as the observation deck and contains the observation room, dining room, kitchen store rooms, and refrigerating rooms. The observation room is situated at the forward end and is one hundred and forty feet long by thirty-eight feet wide, panelled in quartered oak. The floor is of waxed oak for dancing. The observation room is divided from the dining room by folding glass partitions, and an orchestra stand is built at this point so that the music can be used for dancing or the glass doors can be folded back for the dining room. The dining room is one hundred and eighty feet long by fifty feet wide and has a seating capacity of two hundred and eighty-six. The side walls are panelled in mahogany, tables and chairs are of mahogany, and the ceiling is enamelled white with raised ornamental figures. The electric lighting is indirect, large bowl fixtures being fitted over each table. Fireless cooking is fitted at each table for the purpose of keeping vegetables, etc., warm. The kitchen contains ranges, steam tables, plate warmers, broilers, electric toasters, egg boilers, dish washers, etc. The refrigerating rooms contain separate compartments for meats, fruits, butter and eggs, fish, and an ice making room. The cooling system is a twelve-ton daily capacity, carbonic anhydride machine.

The boat deck, next above the Observation deck is finished throughout in quartered oak panels, and a large dome skylight is fitted over the deck extending the full length of the cabins. There are forty-eight staterooms on this deck, together with large public toilet rooms. The officers quarters and pilot house are located forward, and the crew's quarters, mess rooms, recreation rooms and bakery aft. Fourteen life boats are fitted, each twenty-four feet long. In addition there will be carried life rafts so that the combined capacity of boats and rafts will be sufficient to carry all the passengers and crew.

All of the staterooms are completely fitted out with single upper berths and double lower berths, electric reading lights are fitted at the head of each berth. Vitreous wash stands with hot and cold running water are fitted in each room in addition to the large public toilet rooms fitted on each deck.

FATHER VAUGHAN'S WELCOME HOME.

Gives Entertaining Lecture on His Impressions of America.

After an absence of eighteen months from this country Father Bernard Vaughan received a most cordial welcome at Queen's Hall on Tuesday, when he gave an interesting lecture on "What I saw and said in America." Mr. Newton Crane presided over a very large attendance.

Father Vaughan said he had travelled 30,000 miles and spoken nearly 400 times to an aggregate of 500,000 people. He had preached, lectured, and talked in cathedrals and chapels, in theatres and opera houses, in auditoriums and armories. He had spoken in the "glory holes" of great liners, and on deck; in gold, copper, and coal mines; addressed his audiences in snowfields and lumber camps, in log-cabins, among cowboys, at nigger revivals, and in Indian camps. He had been among avalanches and glaciers, had been in a sand-storm, seen a tornado, experienced earthquakes twice, and had been nearly shipwrecked. When on that last occasion the ladies rushed to him and asked, "Shall we be saved?" he replied, "I will save you yourselves." But I have the best authority for assuring you it is as short to Heaven by water as by land. Some of them seemed to doubt it; but after a couple of days they got off the rocks without loss of life.

"Vaughan on Hobble Skirts." That he was going to receive a hearty welcome he felt certain, but no description of his could-convey an idea of the courtesy, kindness, and hospitality accorded him all the time he was in the States from every section of the community, from the President in the White House to the logger in the lumber camp. Such hospitality never was. He had travelled those 30,000 miles, and it was hardly an exaggeration to say he never paid for a railway ticket or for a room in the hotel. He found he was travelling "en prince." New York was the most cosmopolitan metropolis in the whole world.

Dealing with many of his amusing personal experiences Father Vaughan said that before he was out of his cabin he was surrounded by reporters and interviewers, all wanting his impressions of New York and the United States generally before he had seen them. He rather resented giving himself away, but a man said, "I've come from my editor, he wants to know what you think of the hobble habit." He (Father Vaughan) replied, "I don't think it is any good my giving you my idea of the hobble habit, because before I have expressed any view it will be out of fashion. The habits I am speaking against are the habits the ladies will not give up, and habits." That's right; that'll go right in." Next day he saw the headline "Vaughan on Hobble Skirts." A series of lantern pictures depicting American scenes was shown after the lecture.

FROM LONDON TO JOHN O'GROATS.

Peter Adair, who at the age of 70 has undertaken to walk from London to John o' Groats reached Bolton on Saturday.

In an interview he said his purpose was to show that old people ought not to be poleaxed or chloroformed, as a Yankee professor recently said they should. Adair who is a native of Manchester, proudly displayed many tokens of Royal favors, including letters from King George and Queen Mary and the late King Edward.

BANKNOTS ESCAPE BONFIRE

Hoard of Over Six Hundred Pounds Saved Just in Time.

Two stories came from Scotland recently of the discovery of golden hoards in unexpected places. A sum of £262 in bank notes was discovered at Portobello among some rubbish in a bag which was about to be consigned to Victoria bonfire by a boy who obtained the rubbish from a coal man. The lad, Alexander Brown, the son of a laborer, showed the bag to his young mother, a young woman, and the notes were discovered and taken to the police office.

It was afterwards found that the money had belonged to a woman who recently died and that her son-in-law had given the "rubbish" to the coalman ignorant of the bag's contents. An Aberdeen miser's hoard, amounting to £1,300, was found in an old trunk in a miserable garret lately occupied by Lachlan Kemp, a laborer, who died a few days ago. Kemp had lived alone, and existed on simple and scanty food. The money, all in bank notes, was in a drawer nailed inside his fragile box. The room was never locked and thieves would never have suspected that Kemp had such an accumulation of funds.

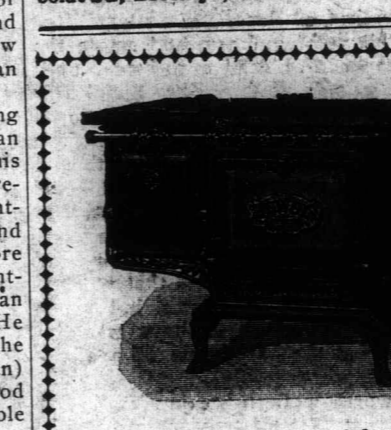
