WAR TIME COOKERY

The great war that is turning the world upside down is also turning old, accustomed diet lists wrong side out. The fact is shown in the expenditure of the Food Control Department. The itemized weekly allowance per head recommended by the department is as striking as it is meagre; four pounds of flour, two and a half pounds meat and three-quarters of a pound of sugar. The ingenuity shown in changing the constituents of time honored mixtures is even more striking. Most noteworthy of all the prompt co-operation of the housekeepers themselves.

Under the high pressure of these strenuous times the British housewife is getting heroic training in the science of home economics. She has found out lately which foodstuffs are imported and which are home grown what elements are interchangeable and what proportions readjustable, and she is learning to put her knowledge to highly practical use. In many an English kitchen of hitherto rigid schedule necessity has suddenly become the matter of substitution, and half a loaf, skillfully handled, is almost as good as a whole one.

The war housekeeper is pressing in to service oatmeal, corn meal and ground rice to take the place of flour. Rice is the cheapest of the three substitutes, but the oatmeal mixture, so a London paper states, "tastes the best." Vegetables in savory combined with stock, make an excellent substitute for meat, and glucose, syrup and prepared milk good substitutes for sugar.

RIOTING FOR POTATOES IN AMSTERDAM

AMSTERDAM, July 2—The Handelsblad prints a report of disturbances over the supply of potatoes in Amsterdam. Hundreds of women and youths collected in the cruise, where a few potatoes had arrived, only a small portion of the crowd could be supplied. Later thousands of persons the newspaper adds besieged a dock where a small barge with potatoes for hospitals had been tied up. The crowd was driven off by mounted police, but they went their fellings on the police building, where all the widows were broken. Several mounted policemen were severely injured by the stones thrown by the crowds.

THE RUSSIAN ARMIES STRIKE AGAIN AND LEMBURG IS THREATENED

LONDON, July 2—The resumption of the Russian offensive, with the capture of the town of Konichy and more than 10,000 prisoners is the most cheerful news the British have had for some weeks. References in recent German official communications to the activity of the Russians have given hope that something really serious was about to occur but the public was hardly prepared for such immediate and successful results, as it was thought it would take a few days for the artillery to destroy the Austro-German defences which were under construction for so many months.

The scene of the Russian success between the Stripa and Zlota Lipa rivers, was the battle ground of much heavy fighting after General Brussiloff's offensive of a year ago, Konichy being on the ater river. This, like the other demonstrations, is in the direction of Lemberg, the capture of which would be of the greatest strategic and political importance. General Brussiloff apparently has resumed his concentric manoeuvre, which was interrupted by the advent of winter and then by the revolution.

PETROGRAD, July 2—The Russian official announcement today says that the Russians have advanced to the Konichy stream, have taken 8,400 prisoners, and also have captured seventy heavy guns. Teuton prisoners continue to be brought in. The official announcement reads as follows:

"Western (Russian) front: In the direction of Kevel (Volhynia) in the region of Rudkasitovichskaya, our scouts under command of four officers, assisted by mines, penetrated the enemy's trenches, killed some of their occupants and captured a number of prisoners. According to the testimony of prisoners destroying the wire entanglements, the Austrians knew of our attack from two deserters, Senior Commissioned Officer Karsokin and Private Kolotuinov. An investigation is being made by the authorities of the governments to which the soldiers named belonged.

"In the direction of Zlochoff after two days' artillery preparation, our troops attacked the Austro-German positions on Konichy Bysski fruit. After a severe engagement they captured three lines of trenches and the fortified Konichy stream to the south of village of Konichy and advanced to the village of the same name.

"As a result of the engagement on Sunday, 164 officers and 8,400 soldiers have been counted so far as prisoners. We also took seven guns and seven machine guns. Prisoners continue to come in.
"Southwest of Brzezany, after artillery preparation, our troops attacked the strongly fortified positions of the enemy and after stubborn fighting occupied them at places. Germans and Turks made counter attacks and formidable positions changed hands constantly.
"On Sunday, we captured on this front nine officers and 1,700 Germans, Austrians and Turks. Some of our detachments sustained severe losses, especially of officers.

"Although on Sunday we took 173 officers and more than 10,000 soldiers. We also captured seven guns and seven machine guns."

PETROGRAD, July 4—The brilliant Russian advance, the news of which has sent a wave of rejoicing thru the entire country, was led by War Minister Kerensky in person. For the last four days of war minister has been continuously at the front, spending every effort to urge the troops to advance. He finally rode to the front line trenches and placing himself at the head of the troops, gave the order to advance.

The spectacle of the popular war minister on the firing line accomplished what toratory had failed to do, and the Russian line swept for ward into the German trenches.

WHOLE FAMILY WAS BURNED TO DEATH

MADISON, Me., June 30—George B. Rowe, 37; his wife, 33, and their six children, ranging in age from one to thirteen years, were burned to death early today in a fire which destroyed their home at Anson, near here. None of the occupants of the house escaped. Investigation failed to show evidence of foul play and the county medical examiner decided an inquest was unnecessary.

New York, June 30—Signor Marco has taken up his residence here to pursue scientific studies connected with the war.

THE FRENCH LOST FRONT LINE TRENCHES THIRD OF MILE EAST OF CERNY

FRENCH FRONT IN FRANCE, Sunday, July 1—The Germans succeeded in occupying today French front line trenches a third of a mile in length to the east of Cerny, north of the Chemin des Dames. This local success, worthless from a military viewpoint, followed a terrific, pile driving artillery bombardment at the beginning of which the French abandoned the line, the trenches of which were flattened out.

This forward step leaves the Germans still without their coveted observation posts. Apparently there was little backbone in the attack, as the success was not followed up.

The same lack of push has characterized all the German attacks recently along the line stretching from the eastward of Soissons to Verdun. Evidently the enemy, after his recent defeat in the Champagne feels the need of local successes in order to encourage the men, who, according to prisoners, are greatly depressed. It is comparatively easy for them to concentrate many heavy guns at any given point and thus drive the French out of small sectors. Hitherto, however, whenever the Germans attacked with their specially selected troops they did not penetrate to any depth, all their attempts to do so meeting with the energetic resistance and usually being followed by French counter attacks costing the German occupants of the demolished positions great losses.

NOTED EDUCATOR DEAD

NEW YORK, June 30—Almon Gunnison, a noted educator, died today at his home in Brooklyn, aged 73. Mr. Gunnison was born in Hallowell, Me. He was president of St. Lawrence University, Canton, N. Y., from 1898 to 1914.
