The local Clearing House announces the clearings for the past week to be \$931,070. The report for the past week shows an increase of \$61,940, over the clearings of last week. This increase is not so large as the increase noticed for the week preceding, which was \$70,690, the clearings being \$869,130 for that week.

Prince Albert Scene of Great Land Rush—Eight Homesteads Near Duck Lake.

Prince Albert, Oct. 22.—A rush at the land office this morning created a sensation in this city, and the city police and the R.N.W.M.P. had all they could do in keeping back the turbulent crowd, all anxious to file on homesteads, which were thrown open. There were eight homesteads, all located within a circle of three miles of Duck Lake, some of them being as high as \$3,000. Emmanuel Pleuvem an old grey-whiskered man, landed a homestead. The old man had for the last four days and nights stayed continually at the door of the land office and this morning when the scramble started he crawled through between the legs of the other men. It was necessary to put large wood doors on the office this morning to keep back the crowd. There were about 75 men in the scramble for the land.
