## CAPE BRETON COAL

Ships of the British Navy Beginning to Use It.

Halifax, Sept. 10.—This week British men-of-war will use Cape Breton coal for the first time. The torpedo-boat destroyer Quail and the cruiser Indefatigable will bunker at the Dominion Coal Company's pier at Sydney to-morrow. They will then proceed to sea to meet the Royal yacht Ophir, bearing the Duke and Duchess of York, which is now nearing the Canadian coast. Vessels of the North Atlantic Squadron will in the future bunker quite frequently at Sydney. This arrangement is due to the enterprise of the management of the Dominion Coal Company, impressing upon the Admiralty the good qualities of Cape Breton coal for steam purposes.

## CAPITAL CRIME

Proposal to Make Anarchy Unpopular in Virginia.

Richmond, Va., Sept. 10.—At the Constitutional Convention to-day Mr. R. Walton Moore, of Halifax, presented the following paper, adopted by the citizens of his county: "At a public meeting of the citizens of Falls church, assembled to express their horror of the dastardly crime of the assassination and to pray for the recovery of our beloved Chief Magistrate, and to tender heartfelt love and sympathy to him and his devoted wife in this time of their affliction, the following resolution was unanimously adopted: 'Resolved, that we petition your honorable body, the Constitutional Convention, now assembled in the city of Richmond, to have the constitution of the State of Virginia so amended that the propagation of Anarchy or the propagation of Anarchist principles shall be constituted a capital crime and punishable as such.'"

## IT'S ROCHESTER

The Yacht Club Challenge From The City Has Been Accepted for Canada's Cup.

Toronto, Sept. 11.—The special committee selected by the R. C. Y. C. to deal with the five Canada's Cup challenges—Chicago Yacht Club, Columbia Yacht Club (Chicago), Detroit Boat Club, Detroit Yacht Club and the Rochester Yacht Club—accepted the challenge of the Rochester Yacht Club. The chief opponent of the Rochester Yacht Club was the Chicago Yacht Club, which lost the cup to Invader. It was urged that more interest would attach to the race here next year if the Chicago challenge was accepted, but in spite of this plea, when the matter was voted upon, the committee decided in favor of the Rochester Yacht Club.

The committee declined to announce the result of the deliberations, saying that, in courtesy to the club whose challenge they had accepted, they would let them make the matter public, or at least the R. C. Y. C. would divulge the lucky club until the secretary of the club could be notified by wire of the result.

## FARMER JOHN

City Ex-Alderman Who Has Made a Success of Horticultural Pursuits.

"I've heard lots of people say that there is nothing in farming, but they are entirely mistaken there," said ex-Ald. Liddy to The Planet this morning.

"I've got fifteen acres of land on my place," continued he, "and this year I have cleared from it about \$700. That may sound incredible but it is the real truth."

Mr. Liddy thinks there is nothing like farming, and by the way he has managed his fifteen acres this year there is no doubt but that he would make a first class one himself. It would be well for farmers who say that they are not making money to take pattern after Mr. Liddy.

This year he had two acres of corn, half an acre of potatoes, thirty tons of hay, and 44 bushels of clover seed, besides a quarter of an acre of sunflowers, which will supply him with chicken feed all winter, all off the fifteen acres.

From this, as mentioned above, he will clear \$700, which is probably more than some farmers will clear on a farm of 100 acres.

Prosperity in farming seems to be a common feature in the Liddy family, one of the brothers in Harwich having the reputation of being the most successful hog raisers in that township.

## 154 BEHIND

Canadian Cricketers Have Big Task Confronting Them in International.

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Play in the international cricket match was resumed this morning at 11.15, the scores being Americans 168, and Canadians 77 for 8 wickets. The day was beautiful and the wicket in fine condition. Chambers (not out) faced the bowling of Clark and Lester. In the third over Chambers was caught and bowled by Clark 77-9-0. Hal. McGivern, Ottawa's captain, then went in, and was given a generous round of applause by the Americans. McGivern played the nice steady innings until he got the slow bowler, Lester, which he hit freely when a loose ball came along. Forrester batted a nice steady innings, but Jordan missed stumping him and he was afterwards out. Clark for 26, and McGivern went out at Lester and pulled him to the boundary for four and the 100 up. "Altimus, medium round arm, then replaced Lester, and bowled a maiden, but Forrester played him for three in the next, and McGivern cut him to the boundary for four. Forrester landed Altimus to leg boundary for four. McGivern batted, Clark away to leg for two and 120 up. Then Adams, medium over-arm, went on in place of Altimus. McGivern and Forrester both hit the new man for two, but in the next over Clark bowled McGivern for 26, and Forrester was not out 25. Both had given a fine exhibition of cricket, the defence of Forrester being very fine. The total score was 120, or 40 runs behind the Americans. The last wicket fell on 51 runs.
