wife in this the time of their affliction, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, that we petition your-honorable body, the Constitutional Convention, now assembled in the city of Richmond, to have the constitution of the State of Virginia so amended that the profession of Anarchy or the propagation of Anarchy or the propagation of Anarchist principles shall be constituted a capital crime and punishable as such."
