How Little Workers Spend Their Joyless and Darkened Lives.

The little lace-work slaves of Nottingham exist in a densely crowded
district of the east, which is known
by the uneuphonious name of
Sneinton. It was in this neighborhood
that Miss Squire, whose statements
before the House of Commons committee have caused much consternation in the town, carried on her remarkable investigation.

Mr. Selby, the superintendent of
sehool attendance officers, told a London Express representative recently
that even he, with his thirty years
experience of the town, could not entirely credit Miss Squire's evidence;
yet he admitted that cases were plentiful in which children were kept from
school to take finished lace back to
the women who distribute it to the
workers.

He instanced a case of a boy of
twelve—a half-timer—who went on a
milk round and worked fifty-eight
hours a week, He would fall asleep
at his desk at school from sheer wearness. The other members of the family could make extra money by lacemaking.

"We hope soon to have power to check the labor of young children," Mr. Selby said, "since it is probable that bylaws under the Employment of Children Act, 1903, will be adopted. Until then we are powerless."

The Rev. M. A. Dodds, who is the vicar of St. Phillip's the parish in which most of the child slavery exists, admitted that Miss Squire's indictment was true.

He accompanied The Express representative to several houses and in each one put the question: "At what age do children begin working with lace?" "Oh, very young—five or six," was the reply invariably given.

"Often," Mr. Dodds added "the children work while the mothers spend the day drinking. One most unsatisfactory feature of the business is that sturdy men and hulking youths live on the earnings of these child-slaves."

Mr. Dodds is anxious that the evil

THE ORIGINAL WEDGWOOD.

Celebrated Vase Which Has Had Most Varied History.

Most Varied History.

Probably the most celebrated vase of ancient or modern times is the Portland vase, which, like many other things of note, has had a varied history. Once it was broken into a dozen pieces by a blow of a madman who was visiting the British Museum. Later it was repaired. One interesting phase of its history was its sale in London and the copy taken by Wedgwood. It was while Wedgwood was at the height of his fame that this Barberini vase was offered for

sale. It is supposed to have been made in the glass works of Alexandria when at their best. Brought to Rome, I was used as a receptable for the ashes of the funereal pyre in the sarcophagus of the Emperor Alexander Severus. The vase was later deposited in the library of the Barberini family. Critics think the subjects of the bas reliefs which decorate the surface bear reference to Eleusinion mysteries.

It is not to be wondered that Wedgwood, who all his life searched for the rarest types of the potter's and engraver's art, should covet this gem of all others. He bid for it, but as the Duke of Portland was his competitor it was arranged that the duke should buy the vase and lend it to Wedgwood for the purpose of copying. The material of which the vase was composed was thought to be precious stone, but Wedgwood found it to be glass, the groundwork being dark blue, so dark as to look black. He was restricted from moulding it lest any injury should result, and it was therefore modelled after the original. Fifty copies were made in japper ware, the body being black, with a tinge of blue, and the relief white. They were considered faultiess and were exhibited in all the courts of Europe, but brought the maker no more than he paid for them. As the models are still in existence copies have been made by Wedgwood's successors, but they lack the finish of the original.

CASTAWAYS ON AN ICEBERG.
