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WHERE RUSSIA'S PERIL LIES

I learn upon an authority I can trust—a rare thing in this country—that the czar, who has been so weak in many particulars, has taken up a firm stand in the determination to see that the Augustin stables of Russian official corruption are properly and thoroughly cleaned, writes a correspondent in St. Petersburg.

A few weeks ago a great English engineer was hastily summoned to Russia by the Imperial Government. He was asked to undertake the work of supervising the construction of the various men-of-war now hastily being built. The Englishman inspected the vessels and said that he would in no wise consent to do the work unless he were allowed to employ English workmen and purchase English or American engines.

temptation overcome. The Englishman flatly declined, in spite of the temptations offered, to have anything to do with the ships, but he declared could secretly withstand a storm at sea. He obtained all further communication with the Government, and went home to England.

Constructed on these principles, a gunboat was launched a short time ago upon the Baltic. In honor of her own launching, the gunboat fired a salute. One of the guns was heavily one-officially it was supposed to be on board a battleship—and the discharge was so shattering that the craft sank.

GIGANTIC SCANDAL. Perhaps the gravest scandal occurred at the Naval Stores in St. Petersburg. They were huge buildings, occupying the whole of one side of the street, and were believed to contain supplies sufficient to sustain a prolonged naval conflict.

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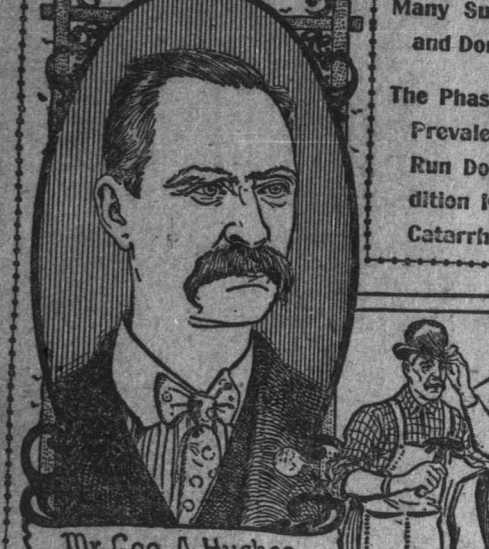
