ANNIVERSARY

The Cashmere Methodist Church
 Successful Services—Dr.
 Thornton Presided

Dr. A. W. Thornton has returned from Cashmere, where he conducted the anniversary services of the Methodist Church there, on Sunday, and delivered a lecture last evening on Ireland and the Irish. The church was crowded on all occasions and the services were considered very successful and satisfactory indeed.

Cashmere is the home of the Gardiner family, the late James Gardiner being one man who was chiefly instrumental in establishing religious services in that place. His name is still cherished there in the fondest memory and he is lovingly spoken of still as "The Squire." The hymn book on the pulpit has his name printed in it. The inscription on the cover bears his name, James Gardiner, and also the fact that the book was presented to him about 25 years ago.

BICYCLES

Special Winter Care Means Considerable to the Rider

Do not allow your bicycle to be stored away for the winter with rusty and dirty bearings, as it will mean more harm than several seasons riding. Special care should be taken that they are stored in a good dry room and not resting upon the tires. The bearings should be all thoroughly cleaned and replaced in vaseline. All nickel parts should be well vaselined also, and the handle bars wrapped with cloth. This all prevents rust eating, and rust eaten comes make a bicycle very hard to push.

There are lots of bicycle riders who have no convenient place for their bicycles during the winter months and allow them to stand in some unsuitable place, which means ruin in the spring to put them in shape for riding.
