The steam yacht 'Faloon' from New York with a party of ladies and gentlemen, guests of the owner, Commodore Bash, has lately been eruising in the waters of the Bay of Fundy and Minas Basin. One of the party, Mr. Goffut, is a prominent journalist of New Yerk and is on the editorial staff of Frank Lestie's.' On Saturday last the Falcon having as guests Prof. Coldwell of Acadis College, Mr. A. J. Pineo Editor of the Casadian Science Montily, and Mr. Johnson of Grand Pre, visited rich mineral regions of Minss Basin. They landed on one of the Two Istands, on Partridge Island and on Blomidon, and made a fine collection of Acadialite, Btilbite, Healandite, Apophyllite, Analate, Amethysts, ete. The Americans expressed themselves as delighted with the scenery and the specimens obtained. The party left on Tuesday for Quebee ris Pictou and Gulf of St. Lavrence. The yacht will meet them at Portland. The Falcon is a model of eonvenience and luxury, splendidly fitted up throughout. She is probsbly the first private steam yacht that has ever visited our waters.
