than the Dominion had. He believed that railway corporations should be made to live up to their agreements. The Minister of Railways and the Railway Com-mission had power to make them do so and he had the rights of the municipali-ties safeguarded. If the Railway Com-mission had not the power to do so now, then it ought to have this power. He intended to put in a clause protect-ing all municipalities just in the same way as Hamilton and Toronto had safeguarded their rights. If an arrangement was reached with the province that would apply to this and other similar bills and would be the policy of the government.

In reply to Mr. Bristol, Mr. Graham said that the Minister of Justice assured him that the legislation asked for and required from the committee was such as could be given by no other body except the Dominion Parliament.

Mr. Lancaster—"Asked for and required." I was particular in that. This statement did not stop the flood of oratory which was thrown out to block the bill, and Messrs. MacDonald, Bristol, Foster and Lennox were heard from once more.

Lennox's amendment to the preamble was defeated by 21 to 46 against.

COUNT FINED.

Castellane Paid \$20 For Assaulting Prince Sagan.

Paris, Feb. 11.—Count Boni de Cas-tellane, the divorced husband of Anna Gould, of New York, was to-day found guilty in the Correctional Court of criminal assault and battery on Prince Helie de Sagan, his cousin, and fined \$20.

The Prince was awarded twenty cents damages.

The encounter between the Count and the Prince, which resulted in the Prince preferring charges against his cousin, took place on the streets of Paris June 2, in front of the Church of St. Pierre de Chaillot.

Bank exchanges at New York fell 3/8 per cent, below those of the same week last year, while at other leading cities the decline was 1/2 per cent.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET. New York, Feb. 11. The market during the morning displayed a tendency to recover on the basis of about 100 issues, maintained by excellent buying in such issues as U. P. and Northern Pacific, Steel and Copper. In view of current talk of dividend reductions on leading railroads, it is well to note that many standard issues are selling at fair levels even if such reductions are taken into account. Thus, Union Pacific, paying 7 per cent, and S. P., paying 4 per cent, would yield the investor about 6 per cent, and Michigan and R. O., on a 4 per cent basis, would yield between 5 and 6 per cent. Similar cases exist in other directions. If the A. R. dividend should be made 4 per cent, the yield would be well toward 7 per cent. It is generally admitted that the Steel Cor-poration, through its policy of expend-ing such sums for betterment and addi-tions and through acquisitions of the T. C. & I. Co., has eliminated most of the water existing at time of organization, so that the common stock is worth a great deal more than its now selling price. Another feature regarding U. S. Steel is the harmonious relations with the ad-ministration at Washington. It is antici-pated to-day that a Presidential nominee may be selected who will have full sup-port of Wall Street.—E. E. Stoppard.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET. The report makes reference to unfavorable news. Unstable trade reaction, declining rail-road earnings and diminishing profits would ordinarily exercise a more or less depressing effect upon values; but in spite of these conditions, prices have been well maintained, partly owing to continued ease in money, partly because unfavorable developments have been well discounted, and partly because the market has had the support of powerful interests. The most encouraging element in the financial situation is the continued demand for bonds, showing that there are funds awaiting invest-ment and that safety is just now a more important factor than price. Among large holders there is the hope that pre-sent business depression will be the last long in its present stage of acuteness.

Recent attacks upon the character of the New York Stock Exchange are entirely justified and have been prompt-ly either ignored or repudiated. A great deal of nonsense is to be heard about speculation. Now, speculation, like many other good things, may be carried to excess, and is then injurious and open to the severest criticism. But speculation within reasonable limits is most beneficial. It is one of the main incentives to enterprise.

The President's attack on options in his last message to Congress certainly cannot apply to any business transacted on the New York Stock Exchange, as options are not dealt in there. The method of doing business in "fu-tures" prevails on the Cotton and Pro-duce Exchanges and could not well be transacted, to the extent of making an active market for the berries of the pro-duction—Henry Clegg.

FAILURES LAST WEEK. Feb. 8.—Commercial failures this week in the U. S. and Canada, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., are 356 against 418 last week, 416 the preceding week and 243 the corresponding week last year. Failures in Canada number 48, against 38 last week, 43 the preceding week and 30 last year. Of failures this week in the United States, 12 were in the East, 103 South, 81 West, and 41 in the Pacific States, and 124 report liabilities of \$5,000 or more against 145 last week. Liabilities of commercial failures for January are \$27,069,514, against the previous year.

MUSICIAN'S DEATH.

Grandson of Col. Stoneman—"Cal" McCarthy Dead.

Charles John Stoneman, a grand-son of Lieut.-Col. Stoneman, passed away last evening at the residence of his father, Robert Stoneman, 34 Alberi Road, after an illness of some months' duration. Deceased was 20 years of age, of a good living and quiet disposition, and was well-liked by all his friends. He had lived in the city all his life and had been with the 91st Regiment band for years, playing a clarinet. Calvin McCarthy, one of the oldest and best known hackmen in the city, died last night at his late resi-dence, 28 Harriett street, after a protracted illness, with paralysis.
