MUCH MARRIED,

But Got \$4,000 Damages From the Wabash Railway.

St. Thomas, April 20.—Evidence of a rather startling nature was given at the hearing of the civil action brought by Mrs. Minnie May Walker, widow of John J. Walker, G. T. R. engineer, against the Wabash Railway Company for \$20,000 damages for her husband's death at the jury assizes before Mr. Justice Magee on Saturday afternoon. Walker was the engineer of the fast G. T. R. freight which collided with two Wabash engines at Tillsonburg on the morning of Jan. 2 last, those engines being on the way back to Tillsonburg from Corinth, where they had taken half of the train. The evidence of the train crews went to show that proper markers had not been placed on the half of the Wabash train left in the siding at Tillsonburg, and that the engines had returned from Corinth without orders.

For the defence Rev. M. J. Andrews, of Berlin, was placed in the box and swore that while he was rector at Aylmer in October, 1896, he married Walker to Hattie Van Patter, a well-known woman around St. Thomas, and the railroad also put up other evidence to show that the woman bringing the action was not the legal wife of the deceased engineer. This was met by the defence, who produced testimony to show that the marriage between Walker and Hattie Van Patter had been treated as a sort of joke, but the court refused to hear the evidence that Walker was under the influence of liquor at the time, the testimony not being direct. Then Mrs. Van Patter was called, and admitted having married George H. Burns, a Burlington, Ont., man. They lived together only a week. She did not know whether he was dead or alive. She did not live with Walker after their marriage.

Mr. Barber, a lawyer from Detroit, testified to the Saginaw marriage, and he believed Burns was still living in northern Michigan.

The verdict of the jury was for \$5,000 against the Wabash Railway. The money will be divided, \$4,000 to Mrs. Minnie May Walker, deceased's widow, who brought the action, \$800 to the deceased's mother, and \$400 to the deceased's father, Geo. T. Walker.

On Saturday Conservative nominations for the Legislature were Messrs. C. R. McKeown, for Dufferin, and J. H. Fisher, for North Brant. West Durham Liberals nominated Mr. Thomas Baker.

SEVEN-WEEK BRIDE

Died After Operation—Sudden Death of Mrs. Midwinter.

William Albert Gibb, the well-known commission merchant, died at his late residence, yesterday after a brief illness. Deceased was in his 41st year, and had been a resident of this city for years. He was formerly connected with Brown, Balfour & Co., and Balfour & Co., for 19 years. He went into the commission business some years ago. He was a member of Court Orient, L. O. F. Deceased leaves a widow and four children. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon, and will be private.

The death occurred yesterday, at the residence of her son, Thomas, of Mrs. Mary Midwinter, in her 79th year. Besides her son she is survived by one daughter, Mrs. T. L. Robinson. The funeral will take place on Tuesday morning from her son's residence, 304 Victoria avenue north, at 9:15 to the T. H. & B. station. The remains will be taken to Brantford for interment.

Death came in all its suddenness to Mrs. George Midwinter, wife of the proprietor of the Arlington Hotel, corner of King William and John street, yesterday. Heart failure was the cause. Mrs. Midwinter had eaten a hearty meal, and afterwards retired to take a bath. The bath affected the heart's action. Deceased was 53 years of age and had lived in this city all her life. She leaves a husband and three daughters, Mrs. R. W. Lomas, Miss Aggie and Miss Annie, and two sons, Albert and Clifford. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

John Gee, an old resident of this city, passed away at the residence of his son, William, on Saturday at midnight. He was taken with a paralytic stroke about two o'clock in the afternoon, and Dr. Wickert was called, but nothing could be done. Deceased was in his 78th year and was an official of the Emerald Street Methodist Church. Previous to the union he was an elder in the Bible Christian church. He was a resident of this city for 40 years, and he will be greatly missed at the services of the church. He leaves two sons, William and Philip and one daughter, Mrs. Alex. MacKie. His wife predeceased him 13 years ago. The funeral will take place on Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. from the residence of his son, 51 Tisdale street, and the service will be held in the church.

Mrs. Mae Santachi, a bride of seven weeks, died at the City Hospital this morning after a short illness. She was operated on, and it was found that another operation would have to be undergone, but she did not survive the first. She was 29 years of age and the wife of William Santachi. The funeral will take place from the residence of the deceased's mother, 161 Gibson avenue on Wednesday at 2 p. m.

TWO BANKS SWINDLED.

Lively Operations of a Confidence Man at Sarnia.

Sarnia, April 18.—A man who gave his name as James B. Young, and a Port Huron address, that is now found to be a vacant lot, is being searched for by the police of Sarnia for passing worthless cheques on the Bank of Commerce and the Bank of Toronto here. Last Tuesday Young deposited \$50 in the Bank of Commerce. Later he deposited a cheque for \$400 on a bank in Springfield, Mass.

On Thursday afternoon he appeared with a cheque for \$300, which appears to be certified to by the same Springfield bank as the cheque he had previously deposited. The \$300 cheque was paid, but later, becoming suspicious, the bank telegraphed to Springfield and found that both cheques were bogus and the certification was a forgery.

Last night it developed that the Bank of Toronto had been swindled by precisely the same operation to the amount of \$580, the losses of the two banks aggregating \$830.
