SWEDENBORG. Interesting Address at Astronomical Society Meeting.

The members of the Hamilton Centre of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada, and their friends enjoyed last evening a programme out of the usual run when the Rev. J. J. Morton gave a presentation of the subject: "Swedenborg on the Earths in the Universe." There is, however, the capacity of distance in the spiritual world, arising from dissimilarity of thought and affection, those in the same, or nearly the same state of mind being near together in the same society; and those in dissimilar states being distant. To make a change takes place in that world, all that is necessary is to come into a similar state with those one wishes to go to. Indeed, it is on this principle that all earthly journeys are made. They are, as to their origin and first cause, changes of state as to one's interior. When that change takes place in the mind, all that is necessary is to get the body transported to where we wish to go. But without such an internal change no journey would be possible. If nobody cared to go anywhere, or to send anything anywhere, the travelling and shipping facilities we now have would never have come into existence. The journeys we can now make would be impossible. Time was when the peoples of different countries did not understand and like each other as well as they do now. Instead of devising the best facilities for intercourse, they built forts, and were more intent on building forts, and in one case a Chinese wall, to fence off outsiders. The population of the empire, with its reserves of strength, afforded a magnificent background for defence, while the response given by Canada, Australia and South Africa to the idea of a general staff pointed in the direction of a reserve power which, if the empire chose to organize it, would place every part of the empire in safety.

ON IDEALS. Fine Address to St. Giles' Church Young Men. St. Giles' Young Men's Guild had a genuine treat last night, when J. Kyle, B. A., of Oxford, associate professor of history at Toronto University, delivered a highly interesting address on "The Ideals of Democracy." Mr. Kyle is a speaker of high order, and although the audience was rather small, the address was none the less appreciated. He first dealt with the ideas, not merely in government, but in the common life of the people. The first and greatest danger is ignorance, therefore knowledge penetrating the whole of society must be our first aim, aiding the individual in his work, the voter, the parliamentarian, and the nation. But intelligence alone will not serve, unless directed by moral standards. If selfishness is our most serious menace, unselfishness and devotion to the state must be our second great ideal. But ultimately all depends upon the individual, who alone can save the state.

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THE CORNISHMEN. The regular monthly meeting of the Cornishmen's Association was held last evening in Arcanum Hall, James street north. There was a large turnout and the president, Mr. J. B. Gummo, acted as chairman. Considerable business was transacted and a number of reports presented.
