Change In The P. E. I. Service

S. S. Northumberland will perform Service Between Point du Chene and Summerside while S. S. P. E. Island is in Dry Dock

While S. S. Prince Edward Island is in dry dock being overhauled for the summer season, the through service between Prince Edward Island and the mainland will be continued via the Summerside and Point du Chene route.

On Wednesday April 23rd S. S. Northumberland will go on this route and continue for a period of about five weeks.

Steamer will leave Point du Chene at 5.00 p. m. daily except Tuesday after arrival of train leaving Moncton

New Town Council Holds First Meeting

April 18—The New Town Council met last night, Mayor D. P. Doyle in the chair.

Aldermen present: R. W. Crocker, W. L. Durick, C. E. Fish, T. J. Jeffrey, Perley Russell, and Charles Sargeant. Absent—A. J. Ritchie and A. H. MacKay. Ald. MacKay is ill.

The Mayor appointed Ald. Crocker, Sargeant and Durick a committee to nominate Standing Committee.

After recess, the report of the nominating committee was adopted, as follows:

Finance Committee—Ald. Russell, MacKay and Crocker.

Public Works—Ald. Ritchie, Durick and Sargeant.

Light and Water—Ald. Crocker, Durick and Sargeant.

Park and Fire—Ald. MacKay, Russell and Jeffrey.

Petitions, Bye-Laws and Licensing—Ald. Durick, Fish and Sargeant.

Police and Appointment to office—Ald. Fish, Jeffrey and Ritchie.

Mayor Doyle spoke thanking the Aldermen and people for the honor done him by electing him by acclamation and asking for their co-operation during the year.

The following new committee were appointed to look into the Better Housing Scheme: Ald. Durick, Russell and Fish.

Ald. Durick gave notice that at next meeting he would move that sub-section 3 B (relating to Dance Hall Licenses) be struck out of Bye-Law No. 9.

The sub-section 3 B, passed by last Council, reads as follows:—

"For a hall or any other place, public or private, where a dance is held and any admission charged, or collection taken, ten dollars for each night; every such dance to close not later than midnight, the penalty for such dance continuing after midnight to be Twenty-five dollars."

It was carried on July 18th last, by the casting vote of the late Mayor J. H. Troy, the vote being as follows:

Yea—Ald. Doyle (now Mayor), Ald. P. Russell, and Ald. H. H. Stuart.

Nay—Ald. Durick, John Russell, and Sargeant.

Absent—Ald. Crocker and Ritchie.

Ald. Fish, Durick and Crocker were appointed a committee to draw up a resolution of condolence to be forwarded to the relatives of the late Mayor Troy, and have the same printed in the local press.

Ald. Durick spoke on Daylight Saving, suggesting the taking of an informal plebiscite of the ratepayers on the matter.

On motion of Ald. Sargeant and Fish, the question of Daylight Saving was referred to a special meeting of the Council to be called by the Mayor.

Ald. Jeffrey called attention of the Council to the side walks of Jane Street being used by teams. He was advised to have the names of offenders handed to the Town Marshall.

On motion of Ald. Fish and Durick the Town Marshall was authorized to post notices on Jane and Radio Streets forbidding teams driving on Sidewalks.

Adjourned.

Thanksgiving Day will in future be observed on the second Monday of November as a perpetual memorial of the conclusion of the recent war, in addition to such other reasons as may be prescribed. This has been provided by a bill which has just been passed by Parliament, and which also adds the second of November to the list of holidays and non-judicial days now observed.

The last two named were defeated. The result was a surprise to many, and the election passed off quietly.

Mr. Gaynor's majority is the largest given a majority candidate for many years.

CIVIC ELECTION REMARK- ABLE FOR ITS QUIETNESS

It has been customary in the past to have the Citizen's Band render music from the Band Stand, and the candidates address the electorate, but this year this feature of the election programme was dispensed with.

Why this was done no one seems to know, as the newly elected Mayor and Aldermen were all prepared to appear before the electorate.

Such a party on the part of the citizen should not exist. If they do not take an interest in the welfare of the town it is impossible for our newly elected Council to put forth the necessary energy when no encouragement is shown them.

The position of Mayor or Alderman is a business one at any time but much more so when the electorate show so little interest. This year matters of grave importance to the town are to be dealt with, and the Council Board should be given all the support possible by our citizens, in order that they may feel assured, that the electorate appreciate their endeavors, to further advance the welfare of our town.

This is the only way in which Newcastle will ever amount to anything and the sooner the citizens become imbued with this spirit the better it will be for the community.

CIVIC ELECTION RETURNS

In the Civic Election held last Tuesday only 249 electors voted, whereas last year 353 voted. The weather was very disagreeable and roads in such a condition that many could not get to the polls. The mayorality chair was not contested, and this also tended in a large degree to lessen the enthusiasm. About one third the electorate voted.

Ald. D. P. Doyle was elected Mayor by acclamation on the previous Friday, Nomination Day.

Fraser Company Ltd. Expanding Business

Royal Securities Corporation Limited announces the public offering of \$2,000,000 Fraser Companies Limited, 6% First Mortgage Bonds maturing serially from April 1st, 1919, to April 1st, 1929. Participation in the underwriting has been given a number of bond dealers, including Eastern Securities Limited, and J. M. Robinson & Sons, two houses with connections particularly strong throughout Maritime Provinces.

Though perhaps not so well known to bond market followers, generally as some other large Canadian lumber concerns and pulp producers solely due to the fact that the Company has always been a close co-operation, Fraser Companies Limited ranks among the largest Canadian manufacturers of spruce lumber and cedar shingles. Its limits cover 1661 square miles of very exceptional timber in Eastern Quebec and New Brunswick. Annual lumber production totals 100,000,000 feet B. M. of cedar and spruce and 135,000,000 cedar shingles. The business was founded in 1876 by the late Donald Fraser and behind it a record of over forty years solid growth and expansion.
