The Cross of Cong.

(From John I. Stoddard's Lecture on Ireland.)

Not far from Trinity College, Dublin, stands a handsome edifice known as the new museum of Dublin. Within its walls are many objects of transcendent value not only to the student of ethnology and archeology, but to all visitors who take the slightest interest in specimens of gold and silver handicraft, which would in any age win admiration, but which are truly wonderful, when one considers the time and place of their production.

The most remarkable of these is a sacred relic, called the Cross of Cong, designed as its inscription states, to contain a portion of the true cross.

It consists primarily of a cross of oak, two and a half feet high, with arms that measure from one extremity to the other about eighteen inches.

This oak frame, however, is sheathed in copper, which is, in its turn, covered with a beautifully designed and exquisitely finished filagree of gold.

Originally eighteen gems were set along the arms and shaft, thirteen of which are still in place, while in the centre is a large quartz crystal, covering a cruciform of a piece of wood, apparently much older than the rest. This, it is believed, is the relic of Christ's Passion for which the shrine was made.

The archeological interest of this reliquary rivals even its artistic value, for it is possible from its lettering to learn not only the approximate date of the production but also the names of the patron who commissioned it and the artisan who made it. Along the edges of the cross have been engraved five sentences, the first of which states in Latin:

"In this case is preserved the Cross upon which suffered the founder of the world."

The other four inscriptions are in the Irish language, and request prayers first for Turlogh O'Connor, "The King of Erin for whom this shrine was made," then for the Arch-

"The Roman correspondent of the 'New Free Press,' of Vienna, says the formalities for the reception of Princess Ena of Battenberg into the Church, prior to her marriage with the King of Spain, have been arranged. Father Whitmore, rector of San Silvestro, Rome, and confessor of the Queen Dowager of Italy, will instruct the Princess and officiate at the ceremony of the profession of faith. This news is quoted, without remark, by our Catholic contemporary of Madrid, 'El Universo.'"

The Chinese Government has conferred the dignity of mandarin upon the Right Rev. Efrén Giesent Francis can, who is Vicar Apostolic of North East Szechuan, China. The worthy prelate was born in Amsterdam in 1868. He joined the Order of St. Francis when 18 years of age, and soon after his ordination to the priesthood was sent to the Chinese missions, receiving episcopal consecration in 1902. He showed an admirable course during the Boxer rebellion, defending the faithful entrusted to his care. On this occasion the heroic missionary was wounded twice, and still bears on his face the marks of his valor.

It is always full of interesting matter, either original contributions or selections from magazines and journals which the average reader has no opportunity of seeing. An interesting news concerning Pater's Ponce is given in the current number, taken from the Observatore Romano—namely, that though England was the first nation of Christendom to offer these contributions to the Holy See, it ceased sending them in the year 390—having begun in 320—and sent none till 1859—Oakes.
