In the Assembly.

The House met at 2:15 p.m. when the Minister tabled the Customs Report. Road petitions were presented from Clarke's Beach and Black Duck Pond, Port de Grave. A petition asking that the Clyde call at Newton, Sunday Cove Island was presented by Mr. Cliff and supported by Sir. R. Bond.

In reply to questions from Sir Robert Bond, the Premier stated that (1) the question of a tariff agreement had not formed the subject of any correspondence between this Government and the Government of the United States; (2) that the total cost of the Hague Arbitration was not yet known. The printing and expenses of the English Counsel had been paid by the Home Government, and the other general expenses were so far being paid by the Canadian, no account having yet been rendered to this country. A statement of payments on account would be tabled later. (3) There had been no correspondence between any American citizens and the Government in respect to the establishment of industries in this country, except in the case of Messrs. Troschen & Lord of Portland, Maine, who will establish Cold Storage plants here.

The statements asked for by Mr. Kent in relation to the expenditure of the Board of Agriculture, and to moneys spent on the Bell Island wharf, are being prepared.

The Premier informed Mr. Kent that the petition of the people of Bell Island, in relation to local self-government had come up before the Government on several occasions, but nothing was yet finalized. The Government hoped to do something shortly.

The resolutions in relation to the establishment of Cold Storage, Manufacturing of Fuel, from Peat, and Manufacturing Explosives, were deferred till Monday.

The following notices of questions were given:

Mr. Hon. Sir R. Bond—to ask the Hon. the Premier if the Government is cognizant of any breach of the Beef Act by any American citizen in the districts of Fortune Bay or Burgeo or La Pointe.

Mr. Kent—to ask the Minister of Public Works to lay on the table of the House a statement with vouchers showing in detail all payments made in the District of St. John's East between March 1st, 1910, and this date, whether from Main Line Grant, Local Grant or Special Grant, or from any other source whatever, giving the names of the parties to whom payments have been made, the amount and date of every such payment, and specifying the particular purpose for which every such payment was made, namely, for labor, material, superintendence, commission or otherwise; also specifying the particular part of the district in which such payment was made.

After these brief proceedings, the House adjourned to-day. On the order paper for to-day is the Report of Select Committee on Address in Reply.

Died of Typhus.

Albert Strong, of Carters Hill, who was removed to Hospital a few days ago, suffering from typhus fever, died of the disease this morning early arrangements being made to have the body interred to-day. She is suffering from a cold.

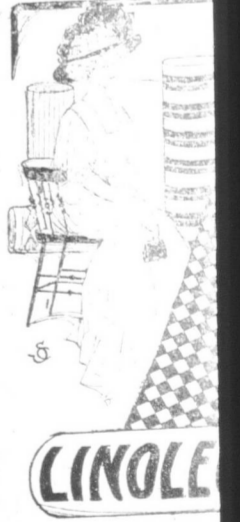
