## in the Trenches.


A Baby Girl

A pathetic war romance centres ound a bright little girl of some four ears, who has just arrived at Bedford n charge of a sergeant-major of the Bedfordshire regiment. She has spent over six months at the front with the regiment, who have adopted her. About eight months ago a company of the Bedfordshires were marching in France for the first line of trenches. when one of them named Philip Omprev. found the child in a ditch by the roadside. No one could go back, so they took the girl with them into the trench, and made her as comfortable as possible. In a few days she had recovered from the ill effects of the wet and exposure and was running up and down the trench, the pet of all the officers and men. One day a bomb nearly filled in a part of the trench. When she had recovered from the shock the sergeant-major anxiously asked a man to go and see that the child was safe. They had left her asleep in a snug corner, and there she was found still sleeping.

The German trenches were about 150 yards away. One morning to their horror the men saw the child standing above the trench on the German side. Cries came from the enemy, but they were not hostile this time. The sight of the girl, little more than infant, touched their sentimental side, she had offers of chocolate and invitations to go and see them. They did not expose themselves any more than the British. It was through the periscope that they saw the child, and one can imagine them crowding round to get a view of the reminder of home. After that the girl went over the parapet quite often. She was as safe in that danger zone as if she had been behind the lines. No German offered to harm her, and once she went close up to their first line trench. The eight days trench duty ended, the little daughter of the company was taken back, and was not allowed to go between the lines again. She was taken charge of by the company storeman, who had children of his own, and was greatly proud of his skill in dressing and undressing the child and of his strictness about the morning bath.

A month after she was found the empany thought that they ought to give her a name. Philip Omprey, who had discovered her, was now dead, and they gave her his surname with Phylis as the nearest approach to Philip. After she had been six months with the company, the sergeant-major was wounded, and came to a hospital at home. The girl came with him, and stayed in hospital, too, the pet of the patients and nurses. The parentage of the child, and how she came to be deserted in a ditch remains a mystery.

ever propounded than that of little Everyone who knows the ABC of childhood knows that the average child has to talk itself into correct speech. Only incessant practice en-ables it ultimately to express itself correctly and grammatically. To at-tempt to prevent a child talking is as deadly a sin as to try to prevent him' growing. It is, in fact, part of his growth. The average child wants to talk. It is the average parent who has not the patience to listen. The story-telling instinct seems natural to most children. When words fail, they fall back on the more primitive and fundamental language of gesture. I fundamental language of gesture. I was never more surprised than when a child of mine at the age of two, while repeating a story of a little boy who tried to hide from the inconvenient attentions of a bad lion, of his own accord in the course of the tale took cover behind sundry tables and chairs, in order to illustrate what happened in the story. I realized in a flash, as I never had before, how fundamental a thing acting is, and indamental a thing acting is, and how much more advantage we might derive from it in school than we generally do.—Cloudesley Brereton, in 'The School World.'
