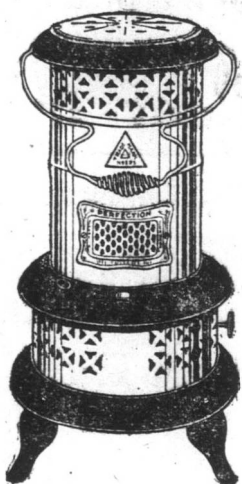

The Brigade paraded as usual at 8
p.m. sharp. Lieut.-Colonel R. F. Good-
ridge being in command, with Capt.
Outerbridge as Adjutant and the fol-
lowing officers on duty: Major G. R.

now total \$3,451.91. An account can
be opened by a deposit of ten cents.
A nicely printed bank book is furnish-
ed each depositor and lads are taught

founded by Lieut.-Colonel R. G. Ren-
dell, C.B.E., many years ago on a
sound financial basis and the only
dividends paid have been the interest

vide himself with tools to learn his
trade, money for educational courses
or anything his money could purchase
to advance the Bank Book's owners
interests. The Major announced that

Messrs. Reid, Son and Watson's office,
Treasurer, and Lieut. W. R. Motty,

up Savings Accounts next Tuesday
and Thursday nights.

Clench of Spaniard's Bay visiting the
Armoury Tuesday and Thursday
nights this week and he was heartily
welcomed and given the "freedom of

French Judge
Leaves Bench.
Paris prisons are crowded with
criminals awaiting trial, while more
than half of the courts are closed
owing to wholesale resignation by judges
as a protest against their inade-
quate pay. Justices of the French
court say that their salaries are \$2 a
month smaller than those of prison
guards. A common court judge is
paid only \$50 monthly. A recent ex-
amination for judges brought forth
only two applicants against a needed
seven hundred.
