Turkey's Treatment of Christians Hotly Resented by the League

Christians Fleeing from Mosul Perish Along the Route—French Offensive Against the Riffians Successful—No Fishermen's International Race This Year.

TURKEY INCURS ANGER OF LEAGUE MEMBERS.
GENEVA, Sept. 25. The Council of the League of Nations, when M. Loucheur, the President, has adjourned after an outburst of disapproval from those present against the attitude of Rashid Bey, the head of the Turkish Delegation, on the question of the deportation of Christians. Bey repeatedly evaded a clear answer to the question relating to the alleged deportations.

CHRISTIANS IN FLIGHT FROM TURKS.
GENEVA, Sept. 25. The British Delegation to the League of Nations Assembly yesterday made public a telegram from the British High Commissioner at Bagdad, de-

claring many Christians were fleeing from the disputed Mosul region and attempting to reach the Van, have been killed as they were unable to keep up with their main column.

NO INTERNATIONAL SCHOONER'S RACE.
HALIFAX, Sept. 25. The local members of the Fishermen's International Schooners' Race Committee intimated to-night that there would be no contest this year as all the vessels are too busy with the fall fishing.

ALL OBJECTIVES GAINED BY THE FRENCH.
FEZ, Sept. 25. A French offensive on a large scale was launched to-day on the eastern sector of the Moroccan front, with the advance of strong forces of French

troops in the direction of Adir, forty miles due north from Kifane. The French declared that all objectives had been gained and much war material captured. It is believed the ultimate object is a junction with the Spaniards who will advance from Alhucemas to Adir, the capital of Abd-el-Krim.

AN ECHO OF A DEFUNCT CAUSE.
DUBLIN, Sept. 25. A Republican newspaper to-day says a movement is being organized in Ireland to boycott all English goods. The same paper says that the voting in the recent Senatorial Elections was very small, which proves, it declares, that the hold of the Free State regime is weak. Eamonn De Valera, Irish Republican leader, is confined to his house for a week suffering from a chill but it is not believed serious.

CANADA-AUSTRALIA TRADE TREATY.
OTTAWA, Sept. 25. Premier King announced this evening that an order-in-council had been passed by the Government for the proclamation of the Trade Treaty between Canada and Australia to become effective on October 1, next.

SYDNEY FREIGHTER DESTROYED.
PICTOU, N.S., Sept. 25. The freighter Dieuze, 1000 tons gross, owned by W. M. MacDonald, Sydney, was burned at her anchorage here this evening. Only Captain Gray was aboard when the fire broke out and he was unable to save any personal belongings.

MOORISH TRIBES FIGHTING ONE ANOTHER.
FEZ, Sept. 25. Tribesmen friendly to France are reported to be active all along the battle front against the dissident Moors. With this exception, calm continues.

RUSSIAN BANK TO OPEN IN PARIS.
PARIS, Sept. 25. The Russian bank, prepared to finance all commercial operations between Soviet Russia, France and Belgium, is to be opened here shortly.

Roman London

HOPES OF HISTORIC FINDS UNDER THE BANK.
Relics of the London of prehistoric days and of the times of the ancient Britons and the Romans will, it is hoped, be revealed by excavations now being carried out on the site of the new Bank of England, Threadneedle Street, E.C.
The Society of Antiquarians has appointed a committee to watch the operations, and now that the workmen have descended about 30 feet an order to proceed carefully is to be given.
The excavations are the most important, from the antiquarian point of view, so far carried out in London, and the discoveries which are anticipated should supply material which will fill a gap in the early history of the City.
Among other things, antiquarians hope to find the remains of great prehistoric animals and a complete section of a Roman street. The excavations are also expected to settle the question of whether there was a London before the Romans came.

An antiquarian said that he hoped the depths into which the workmen were digging would yield evidence of this early town. The only trouble was that the Romans, in building their city, might have destroyed most of the relics.
It is thought that the workmen will soon come upon the old Wall Brook, the river that ran through Roman London, and many relics will be looked for in its bed.

WORKERS ROUSED BY MR. APPLETON'S ARTICLES.

The wide attention attracted by Mr. W. A. Appleton's articles, "Work or Starve," which are being reprinted in pamphlet form and distributed free is shown by the enormous number of requests for free copies, which are pouring in from all parts of the country.

Not only employers of labour but, what is far more significant, workers and workers' organizations are showing the keenest interest. Many workers say they want to learn the truth, as a great Labour leader sees it. Others wish to bring fellow-workers to a saner point of view.

Working men will be specially interested in Mr. Appleton's remarkable pamphlet, for it is to them and to their leaders that it is mainly addressed. Mr. Appleton, who has been secretary of the General Federation of Trade Unions since 1907, says frankly that workers are not being told the truth. Unemployment and the other evils with which the country is beset can be cured, he says, only by turning out goods at a price that will enable us to compete successfully with the foreigner. And this can be done only by harder and better work all round.

Beecher "A Fighting Parson"

A picture of the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher "putting the gloves on" with Theodore Tilton, and engaging him in a lively boxing bout in the office of The Independent, is the startling contribution to history offered by John Bain, Sr., in a letter to the New York Herald Tribune. He introduces it, as an "amusing incident" that occurred during his own connection with that publication, and relates that it took place "at the time of the Heenan and Sayers fight in England, when everybody seemed crazy to become skilled with boxing-gloves and dumbbells."

Mr. Bain continues: "The printers spent part of their lunch hour with the gloves, and were engaged on one occasion," when Beecher and Tilton appeared on the scene and seemed pleased with the proceedings. Beecher said to Tilton: "Theodore, I will bet you an apple I can beat you with the gloves." The challenge was accepted and the printers gladly formed a ring, and provided an umpire. The coats of the combatants were thrown on the imposing stone, and they went at it tooth and nail.

The first round was mainly devoted to sparring for an opening. Beecher was short and stout and had the punch. Tilton, with his long arms, was aiming for Beecher's jaw and a knockout. In the fourth round Beecher sent a sockdolager into Tilton's breadbasket, which brought the recipient to his knees and practically ended the contest, as Tilton had to be helped to his feet. Time was called, and the compositors ran to their cases and the editors to their desks. No blood had been shed, and the best of humor prevailed.

No one foresaw the bitter struggle in court these two men were to have shortly after this, which drew the attention of the whole civilized world while it lasted. Beecher was a giant intellectually, and the work he did in saving the Union has never been properly appreciated. Mr. Tilton had talents of no mean order. He was a

pleasant man to deal with, and deserved a better fate in his ending.

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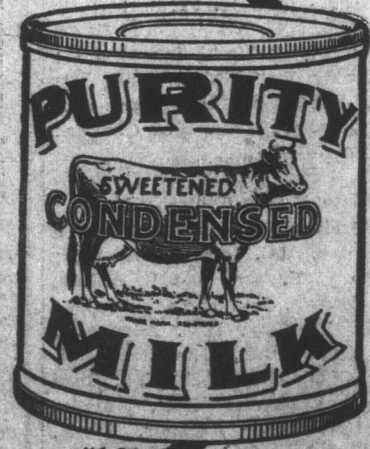
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
