PARIS, April 2.—It is stated the liabilities of the Banque Generale des Chumins for the French Industry, of this city, the largest bank which received a concession, amount to \$10,000,000. Other failures are prominent as a consequence of the bank's depression. Several complaints alleging fraud on the part of the officials of the bank have been lodged with the public prosecutor.

Four dead bodies were recovered from the ruins already searched. Twenty persons were hurt and 40 more seriously injured, besides a large number more or less maimed. At August three were killed outright and about twenty were hurt more or less seriously.

Wellington and vicinity suffered considerably and several people were killed. Wm. Little's house, south of Wellington, was blown to splinters, and Little and four children were killed.

BURLINGTON, Ia., April 2.—Officers of the Burlington and Northwestern Narrow Gauge Railroad, received the information last night that their passenger train due 7 p.m. had been blown from the rails and was wrecked. The baggage man, a small clerk and two passengers were seriously injured and a dozen others badly shaken up. The wind blew a hurricane all night, doing much damage to trees and shrubs.
