FROM START TO FINISH.
How "featherbone" is made—A Trip Through the New Featherbone Factory.

Prompted by curiosity yesterday afternoon an ADVERTISER reporter sought and received permission to inspect the working of the new featherbone factory which has but recently been established in the city. This new and promising industry is owned and controlled by Messrs. Reid Bros. & Co., and, accompanied by Mr. George Reid, the reporter made a tour of observation, noting the progress of the work from the time the raw material of cloth and feathers entered the building until it was turned out in the form of finished corsets of the most approved fashion. Commencing in the store-room where countless sacks were stored, each filled with turkey feathers, which protruded through the sacks and gave each its appearance of an inflated porcupine, the visitor passed into the preparation room in the basement of the large building erected to shelter this infant industry, the sole one of its kind in Canada. All the machines in this room were run by steam power. The first, called the plume machine, has two sharp, circular knives operated by the shafting.
