The total population is 41,000,000, an increase of 300,000. The style meets with approval with the men.**Swept by the Sea.****Liverpool, Nov. 13.—**The steamer City of London from Montreal has arrived. She encountered very violent weather for several days. Seas overwhelmed her, sweeping away 117 cattle and several hogs.**London, Nov. 13.—**The steamer Secret which left Lytham, a village in Lancashire, on the Irish Sea, Oct. 25, on a short voyage, carrying three passengers and a crew of six, is believed to have foundered during one of the recent gales, as the body of one of the passengers has just been found on Lundy Isle.**The Popular Old Man.****London, Nov. 13.—**Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone have been spending the latter part of the week at Brighton. While walking on the Esplanade and after church this morning Mr. Gladstone was recognized by the promenaders and was soon surrounded by such a crowd that it required the assistance of the police to open a passage way to the hotel. His head was continually uncovered in acknowledging salutes. As he entered the hotel there was an outburst of cheering which was long kept up.**Neill Will Hang To-Morrow.****London, Nov. 13.—**The Home Secretary, having denied any further reprieve in the case of Neill-Cream, the woman-poisoner, the execution will take place on Tuesday.**The Chicago Lawyer, A. S. True, who eleven years ago acted as attorney for Thomas Neill-Cream, relates the story of the crime committed in that State. He says that Cream's escape from Joliet was made by the free use of money. Cream's father managed to raise \$5,000 to aid in his son's release, and this was placed in the hands of a well-known politician, who made good use of it. The result was first a commutation and then a release altogether. The crime for which he was sentenced was the murder of Mary Paulina in Chicago in 1881. At that time Cream was a practicing physician on the west side. Mr. True thinks there is something in the man's nature that qualifies his guilt. In regard to this he said: "The man was possessed of two mania—one to acquire all the knowledge he could of anatomy and surgery. The other mania was a desire to get rid of women who were in a condition in which they were a menace to society. This he did. I have not the least doubt, but his mania in one which it is difficult to keep a watch over him. Saturday Neill-Cream attended to the exhortations of the chaplain. The official half anticipated that Cream will cause trouble on the scaffold, and special arrangements are being made to prevent a scene, should Cream try to escape."****The Great Sea Serpent Seen.****London, Nov. 13.—**It is difficult to believe that there is such a thing as the sea serpent. But the monster has, it is positively stated, made another appearance, and has been seen this time by the officers and crew of the Liverpool mail steamer**Angola, which has just arrived in Liverpool from the west coast of Africa. While steaming off the coast between Bey Reach and Lagos a long moving mass was made out about a mile from shore. Closer examination showed it to be an immense serpent. The attention of the whole of the officers, crew and passengers on board the Angola was directed to the creature. There were no flippers visible. The serpent was moving through the water at about six miles an hour, with apparently undulating writhing motion. It was traveling in an opposite direction to the Angola, and was kept in sight for quite ten minutes. The serpent's length was estimated at about 200 feet, and its body seemed to rise several feet above the sea surface. The water at the time was smooth, and an unobstructed view of the monster could be obtained. At one time it raised an enormous head, and glared at the ship, as it seemed. So impressed were those on board with what they saw that a written record of the fact was drawn up and signed. As is usual in cases of the kind the signers have been subjected to a great deal of ridicule, but they are nevertheless convinced that the monster they saw was a marine mystery and a serpent. Such is the report in the Liverpool papers.****"Bloody Sunday" Quietly Commemorated.****London, Nov. 13.—**Trafalgar Square was today the anniversary of Bloody Sunday—the scene of a great popular demonstration of the restoration by the Liberal Government of the right to hold meetings in the square. All of the processions were amply provided with banners and bands, the "Marsellaise" and other revolutionary songs being sung. The windows and roofs of the buildings overlooking the square were crowded with spectators. The square was filled with a vast concourse of people by 3:30. It was an eminently orderly crowd. Ordinary traffic was little impeded. A number of the processionists were well-dressed workmen. There were 40 speakers, including John Burns, C. A. Spence, M.P., James Keir Hardie, M.P., H. M. Hyndman, Ben Tillett, Bernard Shaw and William Saunders, M.P. The speeches were limited to six minutes each. Burns, who spoke from the monument, was loudly cheered. He moved the resolution that the unemployed be aided. His speech was moderate. He contrasted the square as it appeared on Bloody Sunday with the present assembly of today. He said that 30 per cent. of the engineers and workmen in the steel, iron, tinplate and shipbuilding industries were out of work, but that he attributed this unfortunate condition to excessive overproduction. With an eight-hour day's work he declared this would be remedied and he advocated the establishment of labor bureaus.**It is estimated that there were from 30,000 to 40,000 persons gathered in the square during the day.****"Pooh-Bah" Princes.****London, Nov. 13.—**General dissatisfaction is expressed in military circles in England at the fact that the Duke of Connaught should be designated for the lucrative and important command of what is known as the Aldershot division, which, with pay and allowances, is valued at \$25,000 per year. The Duke already receives from the nation a civil list allowance of \$125,000 per annum, besides the use of several residences rent free, the exemption from all taxation and numerous other privileges and immunities of a claracter to save expense. Thus, for instance, the Duke's residence is kept in repair at the cost of the Government, which likewise provides for the firing, lighting, water, and in fact, everything else. In view of all this it is felt that it would have been more just to have given the Duke Aldershot command with its large pay and allowances, to some general officer who is not so liberally endowed with this world's goods as the Duke of Connaught, especially as he has just been holding the equally valuable military Governorship of Portsmouth for several years. Before that he was commander-in-chief at Bombay, with a salary of \$60,000 a year, besides allowances amounting to as much more.**It is these things which tend to diminish the popularity of the royal family in Great Britain, and which give so much cause for disloyal comment among the democratic element of the population, and if it is considered necessary from a dynastic point of view that royal personages such as the Duke of Connaught, the Duke of Cambridge should have active commands in the army and navy they should at least abandon to the nation the pay connected therewith.****The Duke of Edinburgh, who the Duke of Connaught is to succeed very shortly as commander-in-chief of the army, receives from the civil list an allowance of \$60,000 a year as a royal duke, while as commander-in-chief he receives as much more. In addition to this he possesses the colonelcy of several regiments in service, each colonelcy carrying with it a pay of \$5,000 yearly.****The Duke of Edinburgh, elder brother of the Duke of Connaught, is naval commander-in-chief at Plymouth. He, too, draws \$125,000 per annum from the British treasury as a son of the Queen, besides which he has his pay as admiral, his pay as colonel of several regiments in the army, and his pay and allowances as naval commander-in-chief. The allowances in question, which are of a very liberal character, are destined for entertainment, and go by the name of table money. During the two or three years, however, that the Duke has been at Plymouth, he has done no entertaining at all, although he has been very liberal in accepting entertainment organized in his honor by others. He has only pocketed the allowances, and in addition to that has spent the major part of his time absent on leave from his post, preventing his duties to be performed by subordinates.****Infants' Massacre.****Sydney, N. S. W., Nov. 14.—**The police are making close searches of all the premises that have been occupied by the Makins, the family of baby farmers now under arrest here. At Macquarie and Redfern, two suburbs of Sydney, the bodies of thirteen infants were found, and today a search was made of the back yard at Chippendale, once occupied by the Makins, resulted in the discovery of two more bodies. The mothers of some of the babies have been traced. The police found at one of the houses a bundle of long needles wrapped in a blood-stained piece of calico. The theory of the doctors is that the babies were killed by leaving their hearts or spines pierced with needles.**Court Mourning Ceases.****The Queen Attends the Opera of "Daughter of the Regiment."****Alarming Increase in the Suicide of Copenhagen Girls.****The Hopes and Desires of London Tradesmen—Women-Workers' Conference—Mortality of English Dukes—Sarah Bernhardt Indignant.****London, Nov. 14.—**The cessation of court mourning for the late Duke of Clarence was emphasized by an operative performance last week at Balmoral Castle, where the Carl Rosa Company performed Donizetti's "Daughter of the Regiment" in the presence of the Queen and court. A stage was fitted up in the ball room, and the orchestra was installed in an alcove in a side wall, in order that the Queen's view of the performance might not be interrupted. The programme was printed on white satin for the use of her Majesty, but other people present had to be content with the ordinary thing. The Queen led the applause throughout, laughed heartily at the jokes, and altogether thoroughly enjoyed herself.**A FASHIONABLE CHAIZE.****The Swedish Countess Hamilton Dannfelt, daughter of the Swedish consul-general in London, intends to establish a general London for Swedish weaving and embroidery, making it possible for the ladies to do the work in their own drawing rooms on hand looms that are noiseless and easy to work. London society is already showing symptoms of interest in the project, which promises to become a fashionable craze.****SEVERAL COPENHAGEN SUICIDES.****Several suicides of young girls in Copenhagen attracted the attention of the authorities last week. The mournful series has since been continued. It has now been discovered that all the self-destruction has had the same cause. That cause was the work of a young French Don Juan who established himself in Copenhagen as a merchant last winter. In the past few months he has courted many young women, of whom he has promised marriage. It has been ascertained that he has held an amorous correspondence with no less than 34. Sixteen of these have either committed suicide or left the city within the past three weeks. The police have possession of a sort of lengthy and promiscuous diary of his amours kept by the libertine.****THE QUEEN AND THE TRADESMEN.****London tradesmen who have had a succession of bad seasons and would long ago have been bankrupt but for the custom of lending the Queen the money she needs at length the Queen is about to emerge from her 30 years' retirement. They argue that if her Majesty has so far forgotten her troubles as to enjoy comic opera at Balmoral, she may reasonably be expected to patronize some of the local tradesmen who are open to Parliament next year, but they are likely to be disappointed. The performance at Balmoral entailed no personal exertion, as the Queen had only to walk a few steps from the drawing room to the ballroom, whereas a visit to the London theatre would mean big crowds, excitement and fatigue. Queen Victoria, as is her custom on such occasions, treated the Carl Rosa Opera Company in the kindest fashion. The members travelled from Dundee to Balmoral by special train, and thence in comfortable carriages through nine miles of beautiful scenery to Balmoral, at her Majesty's expense. On their arrival at the castle they were welcomed by Sir Henry Ponsonby, welcomed by Balmoral in the Queen's name, and regaled with a substantial feast. After the performance the leading members of the company were presented to the Queen, and signed their names in the royal autograph book. Then all sat down to a sumptuous supper, at which Sir Henry Ponsonby did the honors, after which they returned to Dundee the same way they came, reaching that town at 10 o'clock in the morning.****In due course, if the Queen has not seen her last days, she will be followed, and will be followed by the Queen's children and the Queen's grandchildren.****WOMEN-WORKERS' CONFERENCE.****The four days conference of Women Workers has just terminated at Brixton. An extraordinary number of subjects were discussed, ranging from the management of laundries to female suffrage. About 250 delegates attended from all parts of the United Kingdom, and there were at least 200 American women present, in the person of Mrs. Pershall Smith, the daughter. The conference was noteworthy by the annual proportion of young women present.****ENGLISH DUKES PASSING AWAY.****The mortality among English dukes during the past year has been startling. It is a circumstance everywhere commented on that the three bearers of the title who have died in the past three months have all had American wives. The suddenness of Marlborough's taking off last week was not only quite of a natural order. The truth is that he had not altogether abandoned the immorality of his youth. Certain recent excesses may or may not have been the direct cause of his untimely demise. His was the most striking example in England of great natural genius curbed by wealth.****PARNELL'S BIOGRAPHY.****The executors of the late Charles Stewart Parnell believe that it would be unwise to publish at this time a biography of the Irish leader, although they have in preparation a selection of private papers and letters well advanced toward publication. The executors were surprised to find that Mr. Parnell had preserved every important paper.****SARAH BERNHARDT.****Sarah Bernhardt is to have been highly honored on learning that her "Cypriote" is to be one of the operas, where the divine Sarah, as the Egyptian Queen, is represented as dancing and wildly singing "Ta-ra-ra-boom-dee-dee."****THE LATE DR. FRASER'S SUCCESSOR.****It is understood that the Dr. Marylebone will succeed the late Dr. Fraser, the Presbyterian Church in London, to succeed the late Dr. Donald Fraser.****REDACTOR'S MINERAL WEALTH.****The British Consul at Quito is responsible for a story about the mineral wealth of Ecuador which promises to develop a second California gold craze. He has sent to the Royal School of Mines here a specimen of the gold dust from the Napo country with a receipt of its origin. He writes****that it is a specimen taken from a quantity sent to Quito in payment for stores by an American who has lived a hermit's life many years in the wilderness. The usual adds that gold abounds in the region inhabited by Indians, who bring it to Quito on certain days in the year. When they purchase corn of the Government they grind up nuggets to dust and throw the surplus in the river, to avoid exciting suspicion and pressure to reveal the source of wealth. The consul further says that all that is necessary is the construction of a road from Quito to the Napo district when "it is possible that the dreams of past ages may yet be realized, and El Dorado may at length be found."****ELECTION ECHOES.****Democrats and Republicans Both Claim Ohio.****The Official Count Alone Will Settle the Matter—Democratic Control of the Senate Assured.****HOW THE SENATE WILL STAND.****WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 13.—**On the 4th March, 1893, 25 seats in the United States Senate become vacant, and it is now evident that the Democratic party has captured enough of the vacancies to insure its supremacy in the Senate regardless of figures.**Republican and Populist. Assuming that the Democrats will win the 13 seats in the Senate at the beginning of the 53rd Congress would have as many Senators as the Republicans and Populists combined, and thus would be able to organize the Senate by the casting vote of Vice-President-elect Stevenson. It is reasonably certain, however, that the Democrats can rely on the support of some of the Populist voters, and of the present force of Republican employees or the revision of the tariff.****From present indications the United States Senate will be composed of 14 Democrats, 40 Republicans and 1 Populist.****Indiana, Nov. 13.—**Semi-official returns from all counties of Indiana, except one, give the Cleveland electoral ticket a plurality of 8,303. The one county not yet reported is Crawford, which is held in election given a Democratic plurality of 132. The complete returns will show the Democratic plurality to be not far from 8,500.**COLUMBIA, O., Nov. 13.—**Both the Democratic and Republican headquarters here were closed Saturday. The Democrats claim 500 plurality for the Democratic ticket, and the Republicans claim the State for the State ticket by 1,035 and for the electoral ticket by 987. Only the electoral count will make any further change in these figures.**POPEKA, KA., Nov. 13.—**Republicans concede the defeat of both their State and National tickets by a majority of about 4,000. They also concede that the Tories have a small majority in both branches of the Legislature, and that a Populist will probably be elected to the United States Senate to succeed Bishop W. Perkins.**ANOTHER ROYAL BETROTHAL.****The Princess Victoria said To Be Engaged to Lord Rosebery.****London, Nov. 14.—**Rumors to the effect that Lord Rosebery, Secretary of Foreign Affairs, and the Princess Victoria, the daughter of the Prince of Wales' unmarried daughters, are betrothed have been discussed in the society papers for some time past. While discredited in well-informed circles, and consequently added credence to them. The fact that Lord Rosebery attended the Prince of Wales' celebration of his 61st birthday at Sandringham Wednesday has been construed as a confirmatory indication. If the princess's name in full is Victoria Alexandra Olga Mary, married Lord Rosebery, she will be the second daughter of the prince to marry into the royal family. Her eldest sister Louise being now the Duchess of Fife. Princess Victoria was born at Marlborough House, London, July 16, 1868. In face and figure she resembles her mother. It is believed that the union of the daughter of the heir to the throne with so pronounced a Liberal would be a marked political event. Lord Rosebery, though long prominent in public life, is only 45 years old. His first wife, whom he married in 1878, was the only daughter and heiress of Baron Meyer Amshel de Rothschild. Her death in November, 1889, was widely lamented. By her Lord Rosebery had four children, two girls and two boys. Lord Rosebery is the fifth Earl of Rosebery. In the House of Lords he sits as Baron Rosebery. He is Lord Lieutenant of Lincolshire and Northants, and was Lord Rector of the University of Aberdeen in 1878-9, and Lord Rector of the Edinburgh University in 1880-1.**AN INTERESTING EVENT.****In which a Young Man's Word Was as Good as His Bond.****STRATFORD, Nov. 14.—**A day or two ago Albert E.
