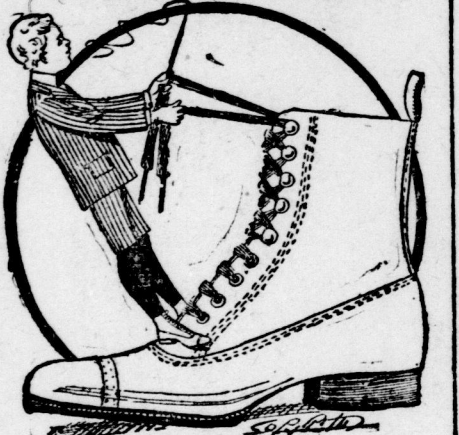

Knocking Out Chinese Boxers

Salutary Effects of the Japanese Snicker Snee.

The French Also Go Into the Execution Business—Expedition Starting to Clear the Rebels Out of Chi Li—The "Open Door" at Pekin—Allies Parade the Forbidden City—Definite Action in Re Russia's Proposals.

Tien Tsin, Aug. 30.—Four prominent Boxers were executed in Tien Tsin today. The French shot two and the Japanese beheaded the others. The executions have had a good moral effect.

Taku, Sept. 6.—An expedition will shortly start for Pao Ting Fu, clearing the villages en route, which were the seat of the first Boxer outrages in the province of Chi Li.

The Russians intend to repair the railway through to Pekin. It is reliably asserted that native soldiery, acting under orders of Li Hung Chang, are exterminating the Boxers in the provinces of Hu Nan and Chi Li.

London, Thursday, Sept. 6.—A. M.—Sir Alfred Gaselee's dispatch, which shows that the situation in Pekin was unchanged on Aug. 29, is the only Chinese news this morning.

OPENED THE DOOR. Sir Alfred, who is commander of the British Indian troops at the Chinese capital, writes under date of Pekin, Aug. 29, to Lord George Hamilton, secretary of state for India: "The allies marched through the Forbidden City yesterday, Aug. 29. The British had third place in the procession, the Russians and Japanese being in greater strength."

BRITAIN MEANS BUSINESS. A Simla dispatch says: "The Fourth Brigade has been ordered to proceed to China forthwith." The cancellation of the order holding back the Fourth Indian Brigade is regarded as important. It shows that whatever the outcome of the Russian policy, the British government is determined to have sufficient troops on the spot adequately to protect British interests.

The Chinese minister in London admits the correctness in a general sense of the cable message sent to him, according to Shanghai advices, by Li Hung Chang, in which the latter is quoted as saying: "Our St. Petersburg minister has persuaded Russia to leave Pekin. You are useless if you cannot persuade England."

The joint commission of Colombians and Venezuelans, appointed to decide the boundary line between Colombia and Venezuela, has completed its task, and advanced the boundary line to the Negro River, reducing the size nearly one-eighth. The land in question is barren country. The decision was received acceptably by the Venezuelans.

A BRAVE ACT

P. C. Bob Black Stops a Furious Runaway on Dundas Street—Was Dragged Considerable Distance.

"Bob" Black, the genial policeman, whose post of duty this week is at the intersection of Dundas and Richmond streets, this morning was the hero of an incident which was witnessed by many citizens, and on account of which the stalwart member of the peace has received many expressions of admiration for his brave conduct.

About 11:15 o'clock one of Perrin's big delivery horses was standing at the side entrance to the factory of the McCormick Manufacturing Company. In some manner it succeeded in freeing itself of its bridle. It then took fright, and ran up Wellington street to the C. P. R., where it turned, and continued its dash down Richmond street. When nearing Dundas street P. C. Black saw it coming, and hastened toward it. Seeing the absence of the bridle, he endeavored to catch the animal by the nose, but only reached it in time to grasp it by the mane. The horse swerved and turned west on Dundas street. P. C. Black retained his hold on the mane, and endeavored to grasp the animal's nose, but was unable to do so. At the corner of Talbot street the wagon struck a pile of earth thrown up from an excavation in the street, and it tipped over. The horse continued to run about a quarter of a block further, when P. C. Black succeeded in stopping it, aided possibly by the partial shutting off of its wind by the twisting of its collar consequent upon the upsetting of the rig. Eye-witnesses of the gallant policeman's act declare it to have been one of the bravest deeds they ever witnessed.

CHICAGO LAUNDRY COMBINE.

Chicago, Sept. 6.—As a result of the consolidation of 22 of the largest laundry concerns in the city into one corporation, prices have been advanced all along the line. The capitalization of the 15c combine is \$2,000,000.

GOT IN FRONT OF A GUN.

Toronto, Sept. 6.—Willie Curry, an 18-year-old lad, while out shooting birds in the northern part of Toronto on Tuesday with several companions, got in the line of fire of one of them named Richard Woods, and received the contents of his shot almost point blank range in the breast and shoulder. The doctors hold out very little hope of his recovery.

SCALDED TO DEATH.

Waverley, N. Y., Sept. 5.—Fireman John Gessler, of Buffalo, was scalded to death under the wrecked engine of his train at the Mill Town crossing of the Lehigh Valley Railroad here. The dense fog prevented Engineer Henry Ducker from seeing a flagman protecting a caboose on the main track until too late to stop his train. He jumped and was fatally injured. Fireman Gessler was 40 years old and leaves a family.
