TORONTO, May 11—11 p.m.—The storm center which was in Manitoba last night is now over Lake Superior moving east. In Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces to-day the weather has been fine and warm. In Manitoba it has been rainy and cool, with a northwest gale blowing, and in the territories fair and warm. Cautionary storm signals are displayed at lake ports. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimaux, 42°—58°; Calgary, 34°—72°; Edmonton, 34°—70°; Prince Albert, 36°—68°; Qu'Appelle, 38°—64°; Winnipeg, 48°—60°; Toronto, 46°—71°; Montreal, 64°—80°; Quebec, 44°—78°; Halifax, 40°—64°.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mrs. Tilley, of this city, has gone to attend the World's Fair congress of women in Chicago.

—The local barbers have decided to close their shops every evening during the summer (Saturday excepted) at 5 o'clock.

—Mrs. McLean, of this city, claims \$250 from the Goderich Town Council for injuries received by falling into a defective drain.

—At St. George's Society monthly meeting held last evening two life members were elected—Messrs. James Priddis and Oliver Richardson.

—J. G. Steven, of W. H. Trebilcock's, and W. H. Boag, of Pocock Bros., intend leaving next week on a three months' trip to the old country.

—The city engineer was down the river day, in company with Col. Macbeth, inspecting the shoals and sandbars. He will report the result to the council.

—Mr. Richard Long, of Buffalo, and his sister May, of this city, have returned to their respective homes after paying a flying visit to their parents in Appin.

—Col. O'Brien, of Muskoka, has signified his intention to the committee of being present on the evening of May 17 at the reception to O. A. McCarry, Q. C., M. P.

—The Peoples' Popular Excursion Company announce their opening excursion on May 24 to Detroit. It will be characterized by the same speed and comfort that delighted their patrons last season.

—Dr. Edwards, of Grand Rapids, Mich., formerly of London, has made his fourth matrimonial voyage. This time his bride is Margaret Edwards, of Sand Beach, Mich. They were married at Sarnia.

—The Canadian Express Company continues to handle freight every day between Port Stanley, St. Thomas and this city. They have not yet missed a single day, and shippers can have their goods forwarded with the utmost promptness.

—The following Londoners were present at a Brantford whist party, given at the residence of Mrs. Hugh Workman, Colborne street, that city, on Wednesday night last: Miss Grant, Miss Barnard, Miss Andrew and Miss Genge.

—This morning Albert Dingman, who was convicted of the late assault for stabbing a neighbor, went on a visit to Toronto. He was accompanied by Bailiff English, and will be entertained by Governor Green, Central Prison, for the next nine months.

—A very pleasant affair took place at the regular meeting of the Women's Missionary Society of St. James' Methodist Church, St. Thomas, the other evening. The ladies of the society presented Mrs. Treleven, formerly of London, wife of the pastor, Rev. R. J. Treleven, with a life membership (\$25) in the society.

—W. J. Hull, of Wyoming, died at the City Hospital a few days ago. He was a native of England, but came to Canada when very young. He first settled at Whitby, but shortly after migrated to North Dorchester. Some time since he removed to Wyoming. He leaves a widow and ten children to mourn his loss.

—A concert under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid Society of St. James' Presbyterian Church last evening was very enjoyable. There was a large attendance, and a good programme was provided. Among those who participated were Misses Boske, Carroll, Atkinson, Gurd, Petrie and Burney, and Messrs. Webster, Ward and Holbeck. Refreshments were served during intermission.

—News has been received of the death in Ireland of Dr. Adrian Taylor, which took place at Clontarf, the residence of his son, Major Taylor, at an advanced age. Deceased was a native of India, where his father served as colonel of dragoons, and was a brother of Frederick Taylor, principal of Delhi College, who was killed at the massacre there by the Sepoys, and a nephew of the botanist, Dr. Thos. Taylor, of Dunkerron Castle, Kerry, whose grandson, H. Taylor, ten merchant, resides in this city. When a boy coming to Europe, Dr. Taylor conversed and shook hands with the Emperor Napoleon at St. Helena. He was widely known, and leaves many relatives in India, Ireland and Ontario.

—As the time for holding the various examinations in the different schools draws near, interest in the details is being aroused among the pupils. Inspector Carson was seen regarding the subject. No definite date had as yet, he said, been settled for the public school examinations, but they would probably be held at the same time as the high school entrance—Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, June 28, 29 and 30. The primary examinations in the Collegiate Institute will commence on Tuesday, July 4, at 8:40 a.m.—the junior leaving and pass matriculation at the same time. The senior leaving and pass matriculation on Tuesday, July 13, at 1:30 p.m. Inspector Carson has received permission to hold assistant kindergarten examinations in this city. These will open June 29.

Death of a C. P. R. Brakeman.

William Parkinson, a young brakeman employed on the C. P. R., died yesterday at his late residence on Elgin street, from the effects of inflammation of the lungs and pleurisy, after two weeks' illness. Deceased, who was about 25 years old, was born in England, and came to Canada six years ago, staying for some time in Toronto, whence three years later he came to London. Fourteen months ago young Parkinson married Miss Alice Fortner, the daughter of a well-to-do Strathroy farmer. Deceased, who was an efficient, reliable workman, was much esteemed by his numerous associates and fellow-employees. Besides being a member of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, he was connected with Union Lodge, No. 389, A. F. and A. M., and also with the Knights of Pythias, the members of which organization will doubtless be well represented at the funeral on Saturday afternoon. Deceased leaves no children.

The Choral Society.

The London Choral Society met on Monday evening for the first time since their concert of the week before. Work was at once begun upon the chorus "Faithful and True," from Lohengrin. The business of the evening, however, was the election of officers to conduct the affairs of the society for the next season, and as the duration of the present season has been so short it was decided to "give the same officers another chance," as one of the members expressed it. Two or three officers made vacant by resignation were filled as follows: Treasurer, Mrs. McCutcheon; members of the executive committee, Miss Bella Saunders, Mr. Wm. Ellis, with the addition of the previous members, Misses Dibb and Weld, Messrs. McIntosh and Ward. As it was found impossible to stem the enthusiasm of the members, practice is to be continued for another month, working on next season's music. At a subsequent meeting of the executive it was decided to take up Mendelssohn's "Hymn of Praise" and present it entire at the opening concert of next season. The selection of another oratorio, probably longer than the "Hymn of Praise," for the second concert of next season, was left over for future consideration. "Elijah" and "Judas Maccabaeus" were mentioned, and no doubt the music-loving public will be presented with some first-class oratorio music in the near future.
