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THRASHER VS. WHALE
A Desperate Battle Seen From the Decks of a Pacific Steamer.

[San Francisco Chronicle.]
Officers of the steamer Nippon Maru tell of a great battle between a whale and a thrasher that took place near the Farallone Islands on Thursday morning, and was witnessed by nearly everybody on the steamer from a distance of a quarter of a mile.

The first intimation that a fight was in progress was when a whale shot up out of the depths off the starboard quarter, going clear of the water by apparently eight feet, and making a great splash as she came out of the water. Immediately there was a great commotion, and the tail of a thrasher could be distinctly seen as it raised terrific blows upon the whale's body.

Off to the south a short distance there were signs of two smaller whales, supposed to be calves that had been separated from their mother by the onslaught of the swiftly moving thrasher. Since a swordfish commonly has a part in the attack of a whale by a thrasher, one was believed to be participating in the fight, though the lumbering whale and the alert thrasher were the only combatants seen from the deck of the Nippon Maru. Sometimes half out of the water, again nearly clear of the foam-crested surface, the whale squirmed and twisted, delivering blows upon the surface with her huge tail that raised a flood of water, but so far as could be seen none of the blows reached the enemy. Over and under the bulk of the whale the thrasher lunged, deftly maintaining the fierce assault. The calves would appear to be following the fighters, and then retreating, but never going near.

As the Nippon Maru's officers and passengers watched the exciting combat, the steamer drew away, with the spray and foam still boiling where the thrasher was fast, exhausting its enemy. But within the hour, it is likely, the thrasher had fed upon the whale's tongue, and the huge bulk of the leviathan was still upon the surface, and the calves were aimlessly searching for their lost parent.

WILL SING AND CARRY FLAGS.
No. 2 committee of the board of education last evening decided that the school children, on the day of the royal visit, should congregate at their respective schools and march in a body to the Collegiate Institute, taking up the positions assigned to them there. They will be massed on three sides of the institute, and will probably sing a number of songs while the royal party are passing. Each scholar will be supplied with a flag. Six thousand flags will be required, and the tender of the London Printing and Lithographing Company was accepted.

LOST A LEG.
Alex. Barr, youngest son of Mr. David Barr, jeweler, Sarnia, was on a train at Strathroy yesterday morning, when he missed his hold and fell beneath the wheels. One of his legs was terribly crushed. The train was brought to a standstill, backed up and the unfortunate young man put aboard and brought to this city and removed to Victoria Hospital. Messrs. David and Joseph Barr, father and brother of the injured man, arrived here from Sarnia in response to a telegram. For some time past the young man had been employed on the Grand Trunk as a fireman. His leg was so badly crushed that it had to be amputated above the knee.

NOT HECTOR.
Rev. J. H. Hector, the negro lecturer, is at Winnipeg. A reporter asked him if the story which appeared in a Belleville paper was true, to the effect that he was the man who had first struck Czechozoff after he had shot President McKinley. Mr. Hector drew himself up to his full height, stretched out a burly chest, and doubled up his fist, looking capable of knocking sense into a cigarette fiend. "Taking a deep breath, he said: 'This,' shaking his fist, 'is the arm that did not rest,' then he said: 'I was not a pacifist to-day of voice, 'I was 200 miles away at the time, and never made any statement of that kind.'"

THANKSGIVING DAY.
Hon. T. W. Scott, secretary of state, replying to Mr. Hugh Guthrie, M.P., of Guelph, regarding the inconvenience which may arise out of the late date at which Thanksgiving Day has been set (Nov. 28), says: "I quite agree with you that a month earlier would suit the views of a considerable number of the people of Canada, but business men have always protested against having holidays in the month of October and November. As you know our canals close generally about the 24th November, and those engaged in shipping object strongly to an additional holiday during the months of October and November. You are aware that the 9th of November will now be a holiday, and, therefore, it was considered reasonable to postpone Thanksgiving Day until after the close of the canals."

THE CITY IS NOT LIABLE FOR DAMAGES
Engineer Graydon Reports on the Kenneally Case—Other Matters Before the Board of Works.

At last night's regular meeting of the board of works, Engineer Graydon presented a report of the approaches to roadways or driveways that have been laid during the year, and on motion of Ald. Campbell, it was decided that no more approaches be laid unless in those places where the engineer deems them absolutely necessary.

Engineer Graydon recommended that a new walk be laid on the west side of Adelaide street, between King and York streets. The work will be advertised on the initiative, and other walk laid between King and Craig and Bruce, for which the resolution was carried.

THE LIBRARY BOARD WAS NOT INTERESTED
Would Take No Action Regarding the Establishment of an Art School in London.

Librarian Blackwell reported to the public library board last night that Dr. May, of the Ontario Art Department, had called on him regarding the organization of an art school, but the board decided that it would take no steps towards obtaining a re-establishment of the school, and the two rooms on the second floor of the library building will be offered for rent to some suitable association. The question of decorating the library building on the occasion of the Duke of York's visit was discussed, and Messrs. Jeffrey and Guy, who had been called to call on the mayor in reference to the matter.

For the four weeks ending Sept. 28, Librarian Blackwell reported that the circulation of 5,435 volumes and magazines, fiction numbering 2,561 volumes, while the miscellaneous circulation amounted to only 1,086 volumes. The average daily circulation of books was 200, and of magazines 28. The fines averaged 66 cents per day. The total fines issued to date were \$8,849.

Messrs. J. C. Judd (chairman), T. Macbeth, G. C. Gunn, J. C. Hazard, James Egan, A. O. Jeffrey and Librarian Blackwell were present.

SHOT WAS FATAL.
Dunkirk, N. Y., Oct. 4.—Alfred de Loughhouse, who was shot by his son-in-law, Reuben L. Young, at Fredonia, during a family quarrel on Monday, died yesterday. Young, who is but 20 years old, is now in jail at Mayville.

HURT BY FOOTBALL.
Hamilton, Oct. 4.—Roy J. Miller, the 10-year-old son of Constable Miller, is critically ill as the result of a blow from a football about two weeks ago. The ball struck him behind the ear with great force. Slight hopes are entertained for his recovery.

At noon Wednesday the Grand Trunk express train ran into a farmer's rig at the Spornish avenue crossing, this city. Isaac Fox, who was driving, was injured about the head and hip.

WAS STEALING A RIDE.
Boyd's Falls, Mich., Oct. 3.—Five men were seriously injured, one fatally, in a wreck on the Grand Rapids and Indiana Railway at McManus siding, three miles north of Boyd's Falls. Their names are: James Conlon, Canisteo, N. Y.; Jay Phillips, Buffalo, N. Y.; Ernest Baker, Cleveland, Ohio; Fred McLaughlin, Detroit, Mich.; and Urban man. Blood's chances of recovery are slight. The others will live.

BOTH DEAD IN BED.
New York, Oct. 4.—Otto Pulich and his wife Emma were found dead in bed at their home. The dead man held a revolver in his hand. There were bullet holes in Mrs. Pulich's head and the husband had been shot in the mouth. The police believe the man shot his wife and then killed himself. Pulich was a real estate dealer, and it is believed business reverses caused his act.

A TERRIBLE MISTAKE.
Sherbrooke, Que., Oct. 4.—Yesterday morning an accident occurred to two trains on the C. P. R. Near 7:10. The engine of 15 had been given a mistaken order to cross No. 2 at Roslin, a mile and a half from Sherbrooke. The two trains met on a deep curve, and so suddenly that there was no time to jump. Engineer Atto and Fireman Dean were buried beneath their engine and killed, and Mall Clerk Michael L. Roy was also killed. Another mail and an express messenger were injured. All the passengers escaped. The killed and injured were brought to this city.

DROWNED.
Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 4.—The body of Moses A. Abbey, of Preston, Ont., was found floating in a slip at the foot of Granger street yesterday. A card found on the body bore the address of Mrs. C. M. Peters, No. 284 Elm street. Mr. Abbey was a license inspector of the south riding of Waterloo. At one time he had been worth \$30,000, but lost it through speculation. His wife had died a few years ago. He had one adopted daughter, Mrs. Nettie Bulmer, of Toronto. Despondency over the loss of his business was probably the cause of suicide. On the dead man's person was found \$22 31 in money and a gold watch.

KILLED BY A FALL.
Toronto, Oct. 4.—David Plewes, who was in business in Toronto for some years, was killed while putting up a windmill at Deer Park yesterday. He fell 42 feet, breaking his neck by the fall.

FOUR MEN DROWNED.
Seattle, Wash., Oct. 3.—Wm. Hiltze, Richard Waldron, Edward Cubert and Joseph C. Wilkins were drowned in Behring Sea, near Port Safety, early in August. Their bodies were found on the beach. Wilkins is supposed to have

FOUR REGIMENTS TO BE HERE WITH DUKE.

Three Corps, Besides the Seventh, Which Goes to Toronto Next Tuesday Evening.

Lieut.-Col. Smith, officer commanding the 7th Regiment, received instruction yesterday that the following troops will take part in the royal visit to this city on the 12th inst.: Seventh Regiment, Twenty-Sixth (Middlesex) Regiment, Twenty-Seventh (Lambton) Regiment and the First Hussars.

His orders informed him also that the Seventh Regiment will leave the city to take part in the military demonstration in Toronto attending the royal visit at 7 o'clock on Tuesday evening, next by a special C. P. R. train. An advance party will leave on the same morning at 8:40 o'clock, taking with them the battalion luggage.

The regiment will remain three days in Toronto. It was anticipated that they would be required to spend four days there, but orders state that the battalion need only report at Toronto at 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning. Returning the regiment will leave Toronto on Friday evening in order to arrive in this city to take part in the local functions.

FOURTH WARD RICHER AND MORE POPULOUS
Returns Made by Assessment Commissioner Grant Shows Satisfactory Increases.

The assessment of the fourth ward as made by Commissioner Grant and his staff show a total gain of \$137,343, and an increase in population of 123.

The jump in the real estate assessment was \$136,312, amounting to \$3,741,490, as against \$2,605,177, in 1901. There was a loss of \$1,150 in personal property, the assessment totalling \$102,990, as compared with \$104,100 a year ago, and there was a gain of \$2,180 in the income assessment, which amounted to \$51,550. The total assessment for the ward was \$3,835,970, against \$3,758,827, in 1901, or an increase of \$77,143. The number of persons liable for statute labor tax increased 28.

The population of the ward is given as 10,925, against 10,802 a year ago, or an increase of 123.

FATAL FALL.
Toronto, Oct. 4.—Under particularly sad circumstances Ernest Argles, the 4-year-old son of Mr. Ernest Argles, of 22 Daycroft road, died at the Sick Children's Hospital as the result of a fall. Mrs. Argles took the child and her other three children, two boys and a girl, to spend the afternoon at Riverdale Park. Little Ernest climbed upon a low bench and had a sudden tumble to the ground. An examination showed that there was an internal hemorrhage from a ruptured artery. So serious did the case prove that the child was taken to the hospital, where he died on Tuesday.

Ernest Argles, the child's father, is lying in a ward in the General Hospital, having just passed the crisis of typhoid fever.

Ross, of St. George, moderator of the Paris Presbytery, acted as chairman. Addresses were given by Rev. Messrs. Smyth and Hughes, of Tilburg, and by Rev. Messrs. Stuart, of Verschoyle, McInnes, of Thamesville, Hutt, of Ingersoll, and the incoming pastor, Mr. Brown. The latter gentleman has made a very favorable impression and stirred a great deal of interest among his new parishioners. Music was furnished by the choir, and solos were sung by Mrs. F. W. Bain, Miss Nilson and Miss Leila Hogan.
