NO MEDIATION UNTIL REVENGED

Russia Must Win Signal Victory Before She Will Entertain Peace Talk.

St. Petersburg, April 25.—The Russian capital is agog with reports of possible mediation between Russia and Japan through King Edward, as a result of his majesty's visit to Copenhagen, though not only in official quarters, but everywhere the Russians seem to be of one mind, that no proffer of mediation can be entertained while the empire is smarting under the sting of defeat. For some time, however, evidence has continued to accumulate that King Edward was seeking to bring about more friendly relations with Russia, and that in that direction were being sympathetically received except by the extreme radicals. Especially has this been true since the consummation of the Anglo-French entente. Charles Harding, the new British ambassador to Russia, was the recipient of a personal letter from King Edward to the Emperor, and Sir Charles S. Scott, the retiring ambassador, who leaves St. Petersburg, will take a letter to King Edward, besides a personal message of the most cordial character which the Emperor asked him to convey to King Edward. Sir Charles took luncheon with his majesty at the Winter Palace recently. There is good reason to believe that the Emperor and the King are very favorably disposed toward an adjustment of the long-standing differences between the two countries. Besides it is an open secret that the Emperor is greatly distressed over the war. He sincerely desires peace, but considers that Russia was not only attacked, and that after what has occurred the prestige of the Empire must be vindicated before there can be any intimation of peace. Nevertheless, though army and naval circles talk as if the struggle had not yet begun in earnest, it is believed that recent events make for a possible termination of the war at the earliest practicable moment. Should Russia win a signal victory over Japan, it is believed intervention might become practicable. The temper of the people is reflected in the utterances of the influential journals, nearly all of which are hostile to suggestions of mediation. The Novoye Vremya says it is no time to talk of negotiations, but only of war. The Russ remarks: "It is left to England to propose terms that would not commit us. We have no faith in British diplomacy."

UNCLE SAM OWNS IT

Panama Canal Formerly Handed Over to United States Agents.

Paris, April 25.—It is authoritatively announced that the contract by which the ownership of the Panama Canal passes to the United States is signed, sealed, delivered and complete.

The title to the canal route is now vested in the Government of the United States. The resolution of the United States Congress ratifying the sale of the canal to the United States was adopted almost unanimously. There were only five votes against it. The second Panama resolution was also adopted. There were only two dissenting votes. The session then adjourned. This completes the transfer of the canal to the United States. The second resolution adopted contains the following principal clause: "The general assembly gives authority to definitely conclude the session of all the property and rights of the company to the United States and immediately hand over to Messrs. Day and Russell, representing the United States, the company's property in Paris, including rights of every nature, the shares of the Panama Railroad Company, all deeds and papers and property at Colon, Panama and elsewhere, as the representatives of the United States may require."

ZIONISTS SETTLE IN EAST AFRICA

Britain Grants Them 5,000 Square Miles Near Lake Nyanza.

London, April 25.—The foreign office has now come to a definite agreement with the Zionists as to the situation and extent of the colony it is ready to give them in East Africa. This is to consist of 5,000 square miles of land northeast of Victoria Nyanza. It includes the Nandi plateau and is very fertile, well watered and well forested. As the native population in this part of the country is not large, a positive source of trouble will be avoided.

An important point in the concession is that the land is only five miles distant from the Uganda Railway and a 30 hours' railway journey from the coast.

If necessary it is possible the foreign office may hereafter extend the concession still further, so as to give the Zionist colony a port on the Victoria Nyanza.

There will be no Zionist Congress this year, but in its stead the great action committee has just met at Vienna and endorsed the sending of a committee to inquire into the suitability of the site for Hebrew colonization. The committee will start in June.

TO KEEP HEALTH MUST EAT LESS

Average Man Consumes Two to Three Times the Food He Needs.

Washington, D. C., April 23.—The average man eats from two to three times as much food as he needs to keep him in perfect physical and mental health and vigor. If he will divide an ordinary meal into three meals he will be healthier and happier and never will have a "grouch."

Such is the contention of Prof. Russell H. Chittenden, director of the Sheffield Scientific School of Yale, who recently has conducted a series of experiments to determine the average human being is not eating too much.

Prof. Chittenden read a paper before the National Academy of Sciences describing his experiments. He also called attention to his own health and vigor, and declared he had been experimenting on himself by cutting down the amount of his own food.

The professor said three classes of men were experimented on—several professors at the school, several students and a squad of United States soldiers.

There was a gradual reduction of meat and starch and a little increase in starch and other foods in nearly all the tests. No fixed regimen was required in any case, the endeavor being to satisfy the appetite of each subject. In only one case was meat entirely eliminated from the diet.

At the end of the experiments, which lasted from six months until nearly a year, and were concluded only a few days ago, the entire lot of men who had been experimented on were in the best of health.

Their weight in some cases was almost exactly the same as when the experiments were begun, and in some slightly lower. Their bodily vigor was greater and their strength was much greater, partly owing to their regular physical exercises during the experiments and partly owing to Prof. Chittenden's belief, to the less amount of food eaten.

The daily consumption of food at the close of the experiments was much less than the recognized standard and from a third to half as much as the average man eats.

WAS AFTER THE CZAR?

Man Killed by His Bomb in St. Petersburg Planned Several Murders.

St. Petersburg, April 22.—The investigation into the explosion that occurred last week at the Hotel du Nord, on the Nevsky Prospect showed that the internal machine was charged with melinite.

The author of the outrage, who was killed by the explosion, has not been identified. He had two forged passports, bearing the names of prominent officials, in his possession. Papers found in his pockets showed that he was connected with the murder of M. Spilagine, minister of the interior, and with other nihilist crimes.

The explosion of the machine at the hotel was evidently an accident. It is believed that it was intended to be used against the ministers as they were welcoming at Moscow the survivors of the Varig and Korietz, which were sunk as Chenulpo, or at the unveiling of the monument to Alexander III, at Moscow in the presence of the Czar.

JAPANESE RUSE THAT FAILED

Togo Plays at Being the Vladivostock Fleet, But Russians Refused the Bait.

Port Arthur, April 25.—The Japanese failed in what is believed to be a clever ruse of war to entice the Russian ships out of Port Arthur. Several men-of-war were sighted immediately after the battleship Petropavlovsk was blown up steaming rapidly towards Port Arthur with other ships pursuing them, demonstrating that it was a chase of merchantmen, but the opinion here is that the Japanese desired to create the impression that the Vladivostock cruisers were attempting to form a junction with the Port Arthur fleet. Knowing the whereabouts of the cruisers, however, the Russian fleet did not go out, and the Japanese ships retired. The survivors of the Petropavlovsk are recovering from their burns and the inflammation of the lungs consequent upon their immersion in the sea. The low temperature of the water proved to be fortunate for them, as it deadened the pain of their burns and enabled them to keep afloat until they were picked up. They all tell heartrending stories.

A strange incident in connection with the loss at Port Arthur of the battleship Petropavlovsk is told by the survivors of that vessel, who state that Vice-Admiral Makarov turned to the signal man and instructed him to signal to the hospital ship Mongolia to come to the outer harbor from the inner anchorage. As the flags were being hoisted the ship struck the mine and went down. The Mongolian, 47 of the crew. It has not yet been definitely established that a Japanese mine blew up the Petropavlovsk, though this theory is generally accepted.

The surgeon of the Mongolia has written a letter in which he enthusiastically describes the fortitude of the Russian sailors, who survived the disaster. He says they are men of indescribable heroism, undergoing the most painful operations stoically. As an example, he cites the case of one man who, after a long time under the surgeon's knife, thanked him for leaving him his legs, and begged permission to smoke, later asking that he might have a drink of tea with his dinner. When his wounds had been attended to, the commander of the torpedo-boat destroyer Sini visited the suffering sailors, the first words uttered by whom expressed their solicitude for the fate of the Sini. "Did she get in all right?" they asked. "Can she soon return to service?" Through his man the engineer of

Chamberlain Finds His Tariff Commission Doing Good Work.

London, April 25.—Mr. Chamberlain marked his return from his holiday by attending the tariff commission, taking an active part in the examination of witnesses.

Great stress was laid in almost every case upon the advantage which the British iron and steel industry derives, and will increasingly derive, from the Canadian, New Zealand and South Africa preferences.

In the agricultural section of the commission, stress is being laid on the possibilities of expansion in colonial supplies and food products for British markets, with the view of making the Empire self-contained.

In this respect, Mr. Chamberlain expressed himself more than pleased and gratified by information he had received on the progress of the work of the commission; it was more than he could possibly have hoped for, and that the commission should have proceeded so far, so smoothly and so satisfactorily.
