

ENGINEER MAURY LEAVES FOR NEW YORK TO SEE TITUS WELLS

Has Concluded His Surveys in London—The Report To Come Shortly.

Engineer Maury, the Peoria expert, who has been investigating the local water supply, and the various methods put forth to increase it, has completed his surveys in London, and left this morning for New York City.

It is understood that while there he will inspect the artesian wells of Brooklyn, installed by Mr. Silas W. Titus, of that city, and who has now supplied the city of London with water at the rate of \$25,000 per million gallons per annum, Mr. Titus to supply all machinery and find the water.

Plenses Commission.

The Titus proposal appears to be in-

creasing in interest to the commissioners, but naturally these gentlemen desire to secure all possible information before committing themselves.

Mr. Maury had but very little to say before he left the city. He pointed out that he had accumulated much data, but that until he has gone thoroughly over it he will be unable to express any opinion to the commissioners. It is understood he has been asked to allow the city to have the report with as little delay as possible, so that something may be done to increase the water supply this summer.

Good Flow at the Fair Grounds.

Engineer Moore stated today that quite a considerable flow of water has been struck in the well which has been sunk on the fair grounds loop.

The well has been sunk 80 feet. Pumping tests have been in operation two days now.

LIGHT THE SIGNS, OR DOWN THEY COME

City Engineer Notifies a Number of Merchants to That Effect.

City Engineer Graydon believes in signs.

That is, certain kinds of signs.

Mr. Graydon thinks that an illuminated sign, when it is illuminated, is a good advertisement for the city; but that one of these signs, when dark, is an abomination.

He has notified the aid of the police, and daily he receives a report of all signs which are not illuminated, and which project over the sidewalk, by special permit of the city council.

And daily the merchants receive notice calling their attention to the fact that their signs have not been illuminated at night.

The result is that quite a number of merchants have placed their case in the hands of legal representatives, who call upon the engineer and endeavor to persuade him that it is a hardship upon the owners of signs to be compelled to illuminate them, as the city desires, every night, and from sundown until midnight.

To all such arguments Mr. Graydon has thus far replied that there is a by-law against signs extending over the sidewalks, notwithstanding the fact that the council have allowed signs to be put up, and that unless they are illuminated he instructs, he will order them to be removed.

A number of merchants were so notified by the engineer today.

He closed with an impassioned appeal as a citizen and father.

Replying, Mr. Whitney expressed the opinion that in five or six years, with present progress, the entire Province would be under local option. "Suppose we were mistaken in our legislation, have not others been mistaken?" he asked. He took exception to the charge that the law was un-British, and quoted from instances in Australia, Manitoba, and Great Britain, to show that it was generally adopted.

"It is essentially British," he declared, amid some murmurs of dissent. He referred to the vote in West Middlesex in the rural sections, and cited an evidence that the people believe in and endorse the three-fifths clause. "To find out how the law works out. If it seems necessary to have a greater majority we will have to consider that; but the Government does not propose in the light of the facts at present at hand to make any hasty change in the law."

RADICALS MAY RULE DUMA

Constitutional Democrats Are Ahead in St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 21.—The elections for Duma electors for St. Petersburg are proceeding energetically, and good order is being maintained. The poll is heavier than was that of last year. Despite the Government's interpretation of the electoral law, which was directed towards weakening the forces of the Left, the victory of the Constitutional Democrats is regarded as a foregone conclusion.

The left bloc complains that the Constitutional Democrats are detaching its supporters by exciting groundless fears that a split in the opposition vote might give one seat to the conservatives. It is expected that of St. Petersburg's six seats five will go to the Constitutional Democrats and two to the Extreme Left.

The name of Petroff, the priest, remains on the electoral list of the Constitutional Democrats, although the Holy Synod is engaged today in considering the consistory's decree expelling him from the priesthood, his offence being persistent defiance of the reactionary heads of the church, especially Pobiedonostzeff, the former procurator-general, whom he publicly described as a "Spanish inquisitor." It is understood that the present procurator-general, Isvolsky, is inclined to defend Petroff against the majority of the synod.

The most conspicuous feature of the final elections in the provinces is the strength of the Radical Left. Those peasants who for prudential reasons described themselves as Independents during the primary elections, when they might have been disqualified, now announce themselves mostly as with the Radical Left. In 27 provinces the peasants have now elected their single members. These 27 are divided as follows: Peasants' Labor Group of 101, 16; Constitutional Democrats, 6; Right, 3; Independents, 2.

The vote of St. Petersburg will be counted tomorrow.

CLINGING TO BATTERED HULK

Attempts to Rescue Handful of Survivors on the Berlin Prove Futile.

Hook of Holland, Feb. 22.—When daylight broke this morning, a handful of survivors of the Great Eastern Railway Company's steamer Berlin from Harwich, Eng., to Rotterdam, which was wrecked off the Hook of Holland yesterday morning, could still be seen clinging to the afterpart of the steamer. The efforts made to rescue the survivors yesterday were continued throughout the night and today, but up to 1 o'clock this morning they had proved futile, owing to the furious seas and heavy snowstorm which raged all night long, rendering it impossible for the tugs or lifeboats to approach the wreck, over which mountainous seas continued to dash with terrific fury. So intense was the cold last night that it was thought those who were still alive and who clung to the steamer last night must have been frozen to death, but some six or eight persons appear to have survived the terrible experiences of the past 24 hours. The stern of the Berlin is so firmly embedded in the sandbank on which she went ashore that it does not appear to have moved during the night.

But One Saved.

Captain Parkinson, of the Holt Steamship Line, who was on his way to Amsterdam on board the Berlin to join his vessel the Myrindon, and take her back to Liverpool, is the sole survivor of the disaster, who thus far has been rescued. He said this morning that the catastrophe was due to the fact that the Berlin broached to in the terrific sea as she was entering the waterway and that before she was able to recover herself the steamer was dashed upon the pier head, immediately "crunching" like a concertina, and parted amidships.

The struggling little village of the Hook of Holland is filled with anxious relatives of the passengers and crew of the Berlin and heartrending scenes are witnessed at the railway station, where the 35 bodies which already have been washed up are lying. Many of these are battered beyond recognition and some are without heads and others without arms or legs.

Doomed Cheer Rescuers.

The captain of the steamship Clackton tells of the attempt to rescue: "We approached in an attempt to rescue them. We saw scores of people struggling in the water, many clinging for brief periods to floating wreckage. But in their benumbed state they were unable to resist the tremendous force of the waves and dropped off one by one."

Swept Off Decks.

"When the Berlin broke in two the passengers and crew were swept off her decks in batches and drowned within a few hours of safety. We could hear their shouts for help, but could do nothing to assist them. We saw scores of people struggling in the water, many clinging for brief periods to floating wreckage. LATER.

SAUNDERSON RETIRES

British Consul-General at New York to Quit Office.

New York, Feb. 22.—Sir Percy Saunderson, who has been the British consul-general in this city for about thirteen years, has forwarded his resignation to the foreign office to take effect in April. Sir Percy has been in the British civil service over 29 years and has reached the age limit of 65 years. He will retire on a pension.

He came to his post in this city from Roumania. During his tenure here he has become a well-known figure both in the commercial and social life of the metropolis.

The announcement of a successor to Sir Percy has not yet been made. Sir W. Ward, now at Hamburg, is believed, is next in line for promotion.

ODESSA AGAIN UNDER MOB RULE

Foreign Consul Warn Their Embassies Subjects Are in Peril.

Odessa, Feb. 21.—Street attacks by the Union of True Russians, a reactionary organization, are daily assuming a more dangerous character, and have brought about a condition of extreme nervousness among the residents of this city, especially the Jews. Business has been adversely affected, the grain bourse has been closed, and financial transactions have practically suspended.

Gangs of roughs invade shops and restaurants belonging to Jews, order the proprietors to throw up their hands and then plunder and ransack the premises. Today a Jew drew a revolver in self-defense. He was immediately seized and conveyed to a deserted courtyard, where his arms and legs were cut off.

Pedestrians are stopped in broad daylight and asked whether they are Jews or Christians, and sometimes they are made to produce their passports. If they are Jews they are brutally beaten.

At first Gen. Kaubars, the governor-general of Odessa, protected the union, designating its members as true patriots. As a result the police make no effort whatever to suppress the anti-Semitic disorders, and fill the role of mere onlookers.

Representatives of local educational institutions and of commercial interests have repeatedly made requests upon which the government has received nothing more than evasive and unsatisfactory assurances that the conditions referred to will be investigated.

The inhabitants of the city have now come to the conclusion to suspend business as a sign of protest until the outrages are no longer tolerated by the authorities.

Gen. Kaubars, the governor-general of Odessa, has at last been compelled to take action against the Union of True Russians for their outrages upon Jews, although only to the extent of threatening them if the recent anti-Semitic attacks upon citizens are repeated. In a decree promulgated tonight the governor declares that almost all the authors of these outrages are youths belonging to the union, eighteen of whom have been sentenced to three years' imprisonment and exile.

Both the universities here and many of the high schools have been closed as a protest against the outrages.

This evening two sailors shot and killed Capt. Zolotaroff, who had arrested some of their comrades who were on strike.

THE BRYCES AT NEW YORK

New Ambassador to the United States Will Proceed to Washington at Once.

New York, Feb. 21.—James Bryce, the new British ambassador to the United States, landed today from the steamer Oceanic, having been detained off Sandy Hook bar over night, and is expected to do directly to Washington. He is accompanied by Mrs. Bryce, Mr. Bryce told reporters that he was glad to come here. Asked about the relations between England and America he said:

"Everybody must know that the great wish in England is to be on terms of greatest friendship with America. I have thought of nothing else since I first came to America in 1870."

He declined to discuss the possibility of war between America and Japan, other than to say he did not think there was any chance of war. Asked if he believed the Swetnam affair cemented the friendship of the two nations more closely, he said:

"I think the friendship has been growing closer ever since. Remember, Kingston is not the world."

"Are you pleased with your mission?"

"I shouldn't have come here if I wasn't. I would like to say that both Mrs. Bryce and myself have been deeply touched by the kind way in which the American papers have published the news of my appointment."

Mr. Bryce said with emotion.

Mr. and Mrs. Bryce took the 11 a.m. train for Washington.
