

BASEBALL, ROWING,
BOWLING, RACING, TENNISTIGERS LOSE OUT
IN ELEVENTH ROUND

Hold St. Louis to Even Score,
Then Go Down to Defeat
Through Errors.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 13.—After battling eleven innings against the Browns today, holding them to an even score, the Tigers saw victory slip away from them in a moment. An excusable error of commission by Herman Schaefer and an inexcusable error of omission by Ira Thomas, were to blame. It was the fifth extra inning game in five days for the champions. They lost, 2 to 1.

Rube Waddell faced them and went the distance. The old fault, inability to hit in the pinches, was much to blame for the defeat. They had chances, but could not come through. The rest of the time the Rube had it on them. Eddie Summers opposed him and pitched the same great article of ball that he has been delivering for the past month. Defeat was through no fault of his.

Tiger Hoodoo.

Jack Sheridan, the Tiger hoodoo, was again back on the job. Jack and the Tigers had their usual row. Summers claimed he was hit by a pitched ball early in the day and had a run-in with the veteran umpire. The worthy battle lasted through most of the day. The climax came in the eleventh round. With one out, Tom Jones grounded to Schaefer. The Dutchman had to make the play hurriedly to get his man and threw low. Jones was safe. Sid Smith, who somehow or other, has always been able to hit against the Tigers since he broke into the league with Philadelphia earlier this year, and smashed one over the Bennett Park fence, came to bat. Summers put over one strike, and with Jones leading off second, Thomas turned to Sheridan to say something about Smith being out of the batter's box. Jones saw that the catcher's back was turned and trotted to second. That lost the game, for a moment later Smith singled to right and Jones beat Cobb's throw to the plate.

Normal Hitting Lacking.

With the team hitting as it can hit and should be hitting, the situation would never have come up, for the game would not have gone into over time. However, in all truth, it must be said that the league leaders got none of the breaks in the luck of the game. Wallace, by a great catch, robbed McIntyre of a hit that would have broken up the game in the fifth. In the tenth Stone stole what would have been an extra base hit from Schaefer by another one of his freak catches, and in the eleventh, after Roseman had doubled, and Thomas had been walked, Mullin, batting for Perry, landed on one of the Rube's benders for a drive that would have won; but Bobbie Wallace, pulled off the greatest fielding play of the day, ending the chance. In the fourth, Crawford led off with one of the typical Wahoo brand of smashes. It was headed for the right field corner, ticketed for three sacks, but Tom Jones stuck out his mitt to defend himself. The force of the impact carried him off his pins, but he managed to crawl to first for the put-out.

OLYMPIANS COMPETE
AT NEW YORK MEET

Sheppard Takes the Half-Mile and Hillman the Quarter.

New York, Sept. 12.—John J. Flanagan, of the Irish-American A. C., a three-time Olympic runner, was the only athlete to establish a new record in this year's A. A. U. senior championship games of the Metropolitan Association, which were held at Travers Island today. Flanagan threw the 56-pound weight 39 feet 1 1/2 inches, beating his own world's record of 38 feet 7 1/2 inches made at Jamestown, Va., last year.

There were several Olympic competitors among the big field of athletes, who contested today and each one of them was accorded an ovation when he appeared.

Flanagan won the hammer throw and 56-pound weight events. Melvin W. Sheppard won the half-mile run handsily, and Harry L. Hillman took first honors in the 440 yards run, beating Sheppard, who ran second. The meet resulted in a duel between the Irish-American A. C. and the New York A. C., the former winning by a score of 89 points to 43 for the New York A. C.
