NATIONAL COMMISSION

All Minor Leaguers Will Be Subject to Draft After Aug. 23.

Cincinnati, Aug. 19 .- The national baseball commission has adopted a new rule cover what rule 36 failed to do, as it has been shown that the old rule has been evaded. The new rule, 51, is: "Whenever a major league club has sold a player to a minor league club the same club then sells the same player a second time on a straight sale, and then repurchases the player, the major league club on or before the 23rd of August, and if such player does not report, then he will be sub-ject to major or minor league draft during the regular drafting season from the club with which he is found playing. As an illustration, the Brooklyn club last year sold Player Finlayson to the Brockton club with an option to repurchase, which it exercised. Under the rules this player could not be sold this year by Brooklyn, the latter retaining an option to repurchase. The records show that this year he was sold outright and again repurchased by Brooklyn. In this case th have to report on Aug. 23 or be sub-


