The Ontario Retail Hardware Assoiation is a lusty infant. It is now celebrating its fifth birthday, and if it keeps on growing for the next decade as it has during the first five years of its existence, it will sure be a big one. At the present time it is the largest retail association in Canada, and is still growing.

There are between 300 and 400 members at the present time, and Mr. Weston Wrigley, the hustling secretary, is optimistic enough to believe that the number will be increased at least 100 during the week.

The Organization.

The movement to organize the hardware men originated some fourteen or fifteen years ago. There had been much price cutting, and general disorganization. In the Western States the first organization took place, and the movement spread. Various attempts were made by the

retall hardware men in Canada to unite. The Ontario association organized in March, 1896, with Mr. D. C. Taylor, of Lucknow, as president. The association gained considerable strength in the Bruce peninsula, and had Palmerston as it headquarters. It did not gain strength in the province, however. Later, in 1901, the Re-tail Hardware Merchants' Association was organized, with E. R. Rogers, Toronto Junction, as its president. In 1903 it was merged with the Retail Merchants' Association. 
