WHAT ONTARIO GETS

Toronto, Feb. 28.—Sir James Whitney read to the House yes terday the text of the order in council of the Dominion Govern-ment containing provision for access to Hudson Bay for the Temickaming and Northern Ontario Railway. In a brief explanation of the order the Prime Minister stated that Ontario was to be given a strip of territory five miles in width running from the proposed new boundary of Manitoba to the Nelson River and terminating in a half-mile strip along the east shore of the Nelson River. This will provide room for docks, terminals, and elevators. Should the Government decide to extend the line to Fort Churchill, Ontario is to receive an additional strip two hundred feet wide from the Nelson River to the nearest point on the Hudson Bay Railway, the Dominion Government agreeing to running powers over that line to Hudson Bay.

The strip from the boundary to the Nelson River will be transferred to Ontario either by grant or by statute upon the Provincial Government making known the location preferred, providing that location is not more than fifty miles from the shore of Hudson Bay at any point.

"I may say," continued Sir James, "that the Government of Manitoba has agreed to pass a statute exempting this strip from any taxation. We have five years to locate this land. There is no compulsion on our part to build a railway to Port Nelson or to build any railway. The only limitation is that we should

locate this strip within five years."

There was no discussion. The Prime Minister stated that it was his intention to go on with the boundary debate, but in deference to the absence of the leader of the Opposition he would permit the matter to stand over until today.


THE COAL DISPUTE IS STILL UNSETTLED
