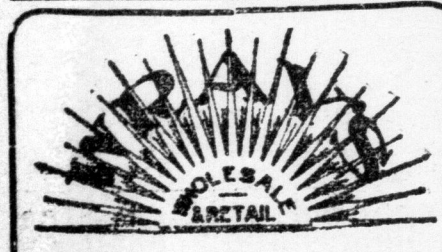

COLD WEATHER DOES NOT DESTROY GERMS

Dr. Hill Declares Lower Temperature is No Insurance From Activity of Health Destroyers

That cold weather does not, as is commonly believed, destroy disease germs, was a point emphasized last night by Dr. W. H. Hill, director of the Institute of Public Health, in a lecture on "Germs and Diseases," in the lecture hall of the First Presbyterian Church. The fact that the most deadly disease germs live entirely in the human body accounts for this, and the prevalence of contagious diseases in winter, he declared.

Dr. Hill dealt with the various kinds of germs, the extreme smallness of the individual germ, and the rapidity with which they multiplied after lodging in the body.

The most deadly disease germs, he asserted, were the most delicate and easily destroyed by ordinary precautions. He explained the action of the germs of the most dreaded diseases, and the precautions necessary to prevent their spread. In this connection he dealt with water, milk and food supply as mediums for the transfer of germs, and urged the greatest care to prevent germs being transferred from one person to another by discharges in the form of sputum, mouth spray, etc.

At the conclusion of the lecture, Dr. Hill answered questions put by members of the audience in connection with various diseases.

MANITOBA UNANIMOUS IN FAVOR OF FREE WHEAT

Resolution Introduced in the Legislature is Carried.

Winnipeg, Jan. 12.—The free wheat resolution introduced in the Manitoba Legislature by H. C. Simpson, a Conservative member, was under debate in the House today. It wound up with the resolution being unanimously carried.

Mr. Simpson's resolution memorialized the Dominion Government to remove the countervailing duty on Canadian wheat in order that the farmers of the Canadian west might be able to take advantage of the wheat clause of the new Underwood tariff in the United States.

BURNED IN WRECK
Engineer the Victim—150 Passengers Escaped Injury.

St. Joseph, Mich., Jan. 12.—Pere Marquette passenger train No. 1, from Chicago to Grand Rapids, was wrecked near here this forenoon, when the engine was derailed by sand and snow which had been blown on the track.

William Granzow, engineer, was fatally scalded, and his fireman seriously hurt. The 150 passengers escaped injury.

It was said the track would not be cleared for several hours.

ENGLEHART HOUSES BURNED.
Englehart, Jan. 12.—The homes of Albert Purdy and Harry Collett, about a mile south or here, were destroyed by fire this morning. Both structures were of wood, and the flames spread with amazing rapidity. Practically nothing was saved, and the children, some of whom were in bed at the time, were rescued in their nightgowns and carried out in a temperature of twenty-four degrees below zero. Those rendered homeless were taken in by neighbors and clothed.

THOMAS CAIRNS DEAD.

RILEY PLEADS "NOT GUILTY" TO MURDER CHARGE

Answers Grand Jury Indictment When Arraigned at Assizes.

TRANSFER CASE TO SPRING
At Request of Counsel Postponement Is Granted Until Next Court.

Thomas Riley entered a plea of "Not guilty" to the indictment of murder returned against him by the grand jury at the opening of the January assizes before Chief Justice Falconbridge Monday afternoon.

A motion was made by the prisoner's counsel to have the case transferred to the spring assizes opening April 14. P. H. Bartlett appeared for the motion, which was assented to by the crown attorney, J. P. McKillop, K. C., and Justice Falconbridge made an order transferring the case to the April sitting of the supreme court.

Riley occupied the prisoner's box only about five minutes. He was led in, handcuffed to Detective Harry Down, just after the grand jury had returned a true bill against him at 3:05 o'clock. He was neatly dressed in a well-fitting suit of black, with striped shirt and green bow tie. He was clean-shaven, and appeared to be in the best of health. He did not glance toward the crowded court room which was completely filled in anticipation of catching a glimpse of the man who is charged with the slaying of George Blackburn, at the Cecil Hotel on the night of Friday, Oct. 3, 1913. Riley, while he assumed a complacent attitude in the box, displayed nervousness in the manner in which his fingers continually sought his face.

When his name was called he stood up, and in a clear voice answered, "I plead not guilty," when Edmund Weld, clerk of the supreme court, read to him the indictment which the grand jury had brought in a few minutes previously. He was removed to the cells a moment later, as soon as the formality of transferring his trial was concluded.

\$250 LOSS BY FIRE TO KING ST. STORE

Overheated Stove Caused Trouble—some Blaze—Another Small Fire.

Fire breaking out in the rear of a butcher shop conducted by J. Lockyer, at 153 King street, near Richmond, last night at 7:30 o'clock resulted in a loss estimated at \$250, and gave the firemen a sharp lesson before it was finally extinguished. The cause was an overheated stovepipe.

The blaze, which originated on the ground floor, ignited a partition, and from there spread to the ceiling and crept between the floor joists above before it was noticed. A passing officer turned in the alarm, and the brigades quickly responded. The firemen worked under difficult conditions, the cold wind nipping the faces and hands of the men, making it difficult to handle the heavy lines of hose.

The brigade received a call to Darch & Hunter's feed store Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Fire, that started from unknown causes, did damage in the neighborhood of \$50. The damage was fully covered by insurance.

Reference was made by several speakers to the slow way in which the Ontario hydro commission had handled petitions sent in for hydro service. In connection with the discussion of the probable ways in which the juice could be brought into the township, it was stated by Dr. G. A. Routledge that the hydro commission had put a clause in its agreement with the London and Lake Erie Railway and Transportation Company, prohibiting the company from disposing of any power along its lines. Had not this clause been inserted in the contract, it was pointed out, the people living along the line of the railway would be able to secure power at but a small expense.

DAMAGE ACTION AGAINST G.T.R. STARTS AT ASSIZES

Milkman Sues for \$3,000 as the Result of Being Struck by Train.

ONE ACTION POSTPONED
Taken Off List at Counsel's Request—Another Suit Transferred to the July List.

The suit of W. E. Phoenix against the Grand Trunk Railway Company for \$3,000 damages was the first called at the January assizes Monday afternoon, after the case of Thomas Riley had been disposed of.

Phoenix, who is a milk dealer, was struck by a Grand Trunk express train west bound at the Burwell street crossing of the Grand Trunk on April 30th. According to his evidence he was proceeding south seated in his covered delivery wagon. His view of the track as he approached was the street and he did not see the express approaching from the east. He also claimed that there was no watchman at the crossing to warn him, and that he heard no bell or whistle from the locomotive. When he first saw the train it was almost upon him and he jumped from the west side of the wagon. He was too late however, and the next thing he knew he was lying amid the wreckage of his wagon under the front part of the locomotive. His leg was broken and the bone was protruding through his trouser leg.

Asks \$3,000 Damages.
He has been unable to go about his business ever since and asks for \$3,000 compensation from the railroad, alleging negligence on their part in not having a watchman at the crossing. Messrs. Gibbons, Harper & Gibbons are appearing for the plaintiff.

The case of C. W. Nichols against the Grand Trunk and the London Street Railway for \$5,000 damages arising out of a crash between a street car and a Grand Trunk freight train at the Dundas street intertwining line was transferred to the July list.

Taken Off List.
The case of Leonard Bolton against the McCormick Manufacturing Company was taken off the list, as the plaintiff's counsel, J. M. McEvoy, was not ready to proceed with the case.

In the case of the Wrigley Manufacturing Company against Percy Short and others, of this city, doing business under the title of the Maple Leaf Gum Company, the case was transferred to the next sitting of the supreme court in April. Infringement of patent is alleged by the plaintiffs in respect of the boxes and wrappers in which the product of the London company is offered for sale.

Naturalization Granted.
Naturalization papers were granted to Morris, Bardenstein, Jacob Copper-smith, Morris Leon Gershon and Alexander Thompson. The first three named were former Russian subjects and the last was a former resident of the State of Michigan.

HYDRO PETITIONS FOR WESTMINSTER

Ratepayers Decide to Circulate Them—Criticize The Commission.

[By Staff Reporter.]
Lambeth, Jan. 12.—At a sparsely-attended meeting of the ratepayers of Westminster Township held here last night it was decided to circulate a petition asking the township council to take necessary steps to secure hydro power service for the municipality.

Owing to the unfavorable weather, the meeting was not as representative as it otherwise would have been, those present being mostly residents of Lambeth, with a few scattered ratepayers from the surrounding district. The hydro question was discussed pro and con, but the chief difficulty that faced the prospective users was the almost entire lack of information on the subject.

Several of those present had heard certain things about hydro power, and had seen others, but there was no one to tell them the straight and accurate facts, and give them even an approximate idea of the probable cost of the service.

Reference was made by several speakers to the slow way in which the Ontario hydro commission had handled petitions sent in for hydro service. It was stated that in the village of Lambeth, a petition signed by some fifty or sixty residents had been sent to the commission nearly two years ago, but nothing had been heard of it since. It was also reported that a similar petition sent from Dorchester last May had so far elicited no reply.

The various uses to which hydro power could be put on the farms were mentioned, but there was much conjecture as to what it would cost the farmers for the privilege of having the juice at their disposal.
