LONDON GREEKS NOT ANXIOUS TO AID CONSTANTINE

Majority Do Not Believe in Present Form of Government.

From information gleaned from among many of the Greek residents of this city it is quite evident that Greece will receive little aid from her sons in this city in her present struggles against the ancient enemy, the Turks. Few local Greeks take seriously on the surface at least, the announcement made in a dispatch emanating from Montreal today, that Greece has recalled for immediate services, all reservists in 1912, 1914, and 1915, which King Constantine might do. Almost without exception the 100 or so Greeks in this city favor a republic with Venizelos at its head. 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METHODISTS LEAD VAN OF FIGHT FOR FULL PROHIBITION

Baptist Pastor Preaches On "Knocking the 'Whiz' Out of Whiskey."
Today's referendum was the theme of most sermons in city churches Sunday. Clergymen of every denomination exhorted their congregations to exercise their franchise. Addresses ranged all the way from direct appeals to vote "Yes" and stop the importation of liquor to reminders that it was the duty of every citizen to cast a ballot. The Methodist churches were in the van of the fight for the stopping of importation. The feature of this last rally was the address of Rev. Mr. Spracklin at the Dundas Centre Methodist Church. At Askin Street Church Rev. T. Cosby Morris spoke on "Liberty and The Women's Cause at the Polls." The first Methodist Church held a special musical and temperance praise service in the evening. At Hyatt Avenue Church the pastor, Rev. George McKinley, took as his topic, "Is Your Duty to Vote Yes?" Mrs. Harrison of the W. C. T. U. made a final appeal in support of the prohibition party at Wellington Street Church.

Baptist Churches Are Active.
Baptist churches also took a leading part in appealing for a "Yes" vote. Rev. N. S. McKeechie at the Wortley Road Church spoke on "What Shall We Do on Monday?" Knocking the "Whiz" Out of Whiskey" was the topic of Rev. T. S. Roy at the Talbot Street Baptist Church. Presbyterian ministers made appeals on behalf of the "dry" forces. Rev. D. L. McCrae at Hamilton Road Church prefaced his sermon with an appeal of this kind.

In Other Churches.
Rev. W. R. McIntosh's sermon at King Street Presbyterian Church on "The Unknown Warrior" was centered on democracy and drink. "The Curse of Strong Drink" was the topic of Rev. James McKay's sermon at New St. James' Church.

References to the referendum were made in nearly all the Anglican churches. Rev. Leslie Armistead at St. James' Church, based his entire morning sermon on the question of "Yes or No." At the other churches the matter was dealt with in short addresses preceding the sermons or as part of the sermons themselves.

Members of the local branch of the G. W. A. celebrated the sixth anniversary of the battle of Ypres this morning by attending divine service at the Church of the Sacred Heart. They were escorted to the church by the band of the Salvation Army. An inspiring sermon was preached by Rev. Father Gnam.

The death of Mrs. Magee, wife of James D. Magee, took place today in her 25th year following a long illness. She is survived by her husband, two sons and one daughter.

CHATHAM CHINESE CLUB.
CHATHAM, April 17.—The inaugural meeting of the Chatham branch of the Chinese Nationalist League was held in this city this afternoon. Senator Douglas was interested in the league. Addresses were given by Chinese representatives from Windsor, Chatham, London, Brantford, Hamilton, Toronto and Kingston. A banquet followed the meeting.

DEPUTATION TO URGE HARBOR IMPROVEMENTS

Middlesex and Elgin Municipalities To Send Representatives To Ottawa.

WANT PLANS COMPLETED
Port Stanley Railroad and Village Are At Variance Over Bridge.

At a meeting of representatives of the various municipalities and others interested in the improvement of Port Stanley harbor, held in the London Chamber of Commerce on Saturday, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"That the municipalities and others interested be asked to send a deputation to Ottawa at an early date, provided that an agreement is reached between the London and Port Stanley Railway Board and Port Stanley Village regarding the bridge. And that the deputation ask that steps be taken towards the completion of the plan recorded in the chief engineer's report of June 22, 1920, for the improvement of the harbor."

The following were present at the meeting: Representing St. Thomas, Mayor F. L. Brinkman, ex-Mayor E. A. Horton, W. B. Doherty, city clerk, and George Geddes, of the board of trade; representing the London and Port Stanley Railway, Sir Adam Beck, Philip Pocock and J. E. Richards, manager. The chamber of commerce was represented by John M. Moore, F. W. McFarland, W. N. Manning and Gordon Phillips, secretary. Aid P. J. Watt was present from London City Council. J. M. Moore presided, and at the outset of the proceedings made a statement regarding the steps which had already been taken in the matter. Mr. Moore said that last year a joint deputation representing Port Stanley, St. Thomas and London, and Elgin and Middlesex Counties, visited Ottawa, and in conference with the deputy minister of public works, Mr. J. B. Hunter, and the Hon. Dr. Reid, minister of railways, an understanding was arrived at concerning the future development of Port Stanley harbor.

Gradual Improvement.
The program for the gradual improvement of the harbor included the following:

The building of a new east pier making a 175-foot channel between it and the present west pier; the removal of the old and partly submerged east pier, the extension of the east breakwater some 500 feet nearer the shore and the erection of a checkwater outside both the west and east breakwater to protect in some measure the harbor from the heavy winter winds.

The program also included some improvement to the inner harbor and the reconstruction of the highway bridge near the London and Port Stanley station, including a 50-foot lift span. The chief engineer's report of June 22, 1920, contained details of all these improvements, which were also shown on a blue print furnished by the department.

Bridge Mere Bagatelle.
Last year approximately \$25,000 was expended on construction and repairs, and \$25,000 on dredging, and it was understood that the work of construction would be proceeded with in each succeeding year, but unfortunately there was a difference of opinion regarding the bridge.

The chamber of commerce, finding out that there was no provision made in the main estimates of the Federal House this year for Port Stanley harbor, asked Major Crony to interview the Hon. Mr. McCurdy, the new minister, in the matter. The minister wrote Major Crony that he "would have no question of work on Port Stanley come up for consideration and discussion in connection with the supplementary estimates."

"This meeting," said the chairman, "is called to consider what steps, if any, should be taken to insure the appropriation of a sum of money in the supplementary estimates to be expended towards the recommended program of improvement. We have reason to believe that our chances of receiving any appropriation at this session are not very good unless strong representations are made so as to convince the new minister and the minister of finance of the urgent necessity for the work."

Need Definite Agreement.
At our last meeting the directors of the chamber of commerce discussed the whole matter, and it was unanimously agreed that our chances of securing what we want will be materially lessened if the various municipal bodies and others interested have not definitely agreed upon what they want. It is hoped that some satisfactory understanding will be reached at this meeting and a decision arrived at as to what steps, if any, should be taken to have some part of the proposed program of construction authorized for completion this year."

The chairman also intimated that a letter had been received from Elgin County Council stating that they had appointed a deputation to meet the minister of public works regarding the bridge. The county of Elgin is granting upwards of \$20,000 in order to induce the federal authorities to build over the bridge, which is now in need of considerable repairs, and convert it into a jack-knife bridge or swing bridge.

Sir Adam Beck pointed out that the city of London had a much greater interest in this project than the local municipalities. What was wanted most urgently was a safe harbor, good for fishing boats, but more so for the ferry boats and train steamers.

The erection of a grain elevator would also be a great boon, as the grain could be brought to Port Stanley and distributed over the London and Port Stanley Railway.

Is Serious Matter.
But the narrowness of the entrance and outlet of the harbor was a serious matter for the larger boats, and they ought to do as was to approach the Government and get the outer harbor improved and repaired. It would be worth spending \$1,000,000 on the project, if necessary. He did not think that more money should be spent in going up the river, where the cost of dredging would amount to a considerable sum. He was of the opinion that the Government should not be asked to assume a greater responsibility, but that they be requested to go on with the plans approved ten years ago.

Aid. Watt pointed out that the present harbor basin was congested, and that the fishing boats must go up the creek. They could not do that without having a bridge that they could pass under.

Want Plans Followed.
"But we want the original plans carried out," exclaimed Sir Adam Beck. "They are absolutely essential to the welfare of the city of London. The draught in the outer harbor is so low that it is a danger to shipping, and the harbor is so narrow that there is no room to turn."

W. B. Doherty declared that the county of Elgin was particularly interested in the construction of a swing bridge, and was willing to give \$20,000 to the department of public works if they would take it over. But Sir Adam Beck maintained that the bridge was only a local matter. "What we want," said Mr. Pocock, "is the outer harbor improved. This bridge is a red herring drawn across the trail. The harbor is only 50 feet wide, and is a menace to shipping. As far as the bridge is concerned, it is a mere bagatelle. They want to unload that bridge on us every time."

Mayor Brinkman asserted that they had agreed to have the bridge last year, and that Sir Adam Beck had agreed with London in the matter. But Mr. Pocock would not accept this. "We have got a lot of money invested in the outer harbor," he said. "The captains of the ferry boats say that they are not safe while it remains as at present," declared Sir Adam.

Mayor Brinkman agreed with this, and said that they had lost the running of the steamer Roosevelt owing to the state of the harbor. The discussion Sir Adam Beck alluded to the matter of the overhead bridge which the railway commission had in contemplation. He stated that the authorities of the village of Port Stanley had agreed to improve certain streets if the commission would agree to withdraw the plans for the construction of this bridge.

"We also want to build a new station and freight sheds and to do a lot of terminal work," said Sir Adam. Mr. Horton moved that the municipalities send a deputation to the Government, providing that an agreement is arrived at between the London and Port Stanley Railway and the village of Port Stanley, and that the bridge be built, and that the railway be carried unanimously.

SUICIDE FORBIDDEN FOR YEAR BY COURT
Court Places Man Who Planned Death On Probation.

DETROIT, April 17.—If Harold Charlton kills himself within the next year he will violate one of the terms of probation as laid down for him by Judge Kelan. Charlton is the man whose hand was stayed by policemen just as he was about to end his life of disappointment in love.

When Patrolman Albert Bowie saw Charlton at Twelfth and Spruce streets early one morning, he investigated, and found Charlton had a revolver under his coat. There was one shell in the revolver, and Charlton explained that he was about to shoot himself. He told Judge Kelan he was made in love with a woman whom he later learned was married, and that when she informed him all was over between them he decided to kill himself. He was charged with carrying concealed weapons. The terms of the probation are that he report at stated times and refrain from suicide for one year.

DEATH LIST NOW 83 'MORE THAN 50 HURT'
Damage Caused To Property by Tornado Will Be Very Heavy.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 17.—Incomplete reports from the six states swept late Friday and Saturday by storms showed tonight a death list of 83, with more than 50 hurt, and property damage estimated at \$1,000,000.

The extent of property loss cannot be determined for days. As compiled tonight by state, the death list was: Texas, 9; Arkansas, 52; Mississippi, 8; and Alabama, 14.

In Arkansas the injured list had reached 71 tonight. There were no deaths reported in Georgia and Tennessee.

AUSTRIANS FAVOR FUSION WITH GERMANY
Storm Fails To Cool Enthusiasm of Big Crowds.

VIENNA, April 17.—Notwithstanding the formal disapproval of the Government, demonstrations in favor of fusion with Germany were held throughout the country today. Heavy snow storms at Innsbruck in Tyrol failed to chill the enthusiasm of the meetings, which came as a climax to the agitation of the last three days, following the ultimatum of the Entente against the Austro-German movement.

In Vienna enormous crowds gathered in Rathaus Square under a cold rain-fall and listened for hours to speeches. Afterwards the crowds paraded through the boulevards with bands playing, singing German songs and carrying red, black and yellow banners. The crowd was composed of the business, professional and civil servant classes and students and members of educational organizations.

There was entire absence of disorder. The speeches, while moderate in tone, were insistent on the early accomplishment of a union with Germany as the only salvation for Austria.

WILL RETURN TO WORK—IF
TORONTO, April 17.—Striking packers whose workers decided at a meeting held this afternoon that they would return to work in the abattoirs if the packers would sign an agreement to employ them for a period of six months, guaranteeing hours and conditions of work. The men went on strike two weeks ago against a cut in wages of 12½ per cent.

ST. THOMAS LOOKS FOR RECORD-MAKING REFERENDUM VOTE

Port Burwell Church Celebrates 102nd Anniversary of Its Founding.

TRYING TO HELP MOTHER
But Syracuse Boy Is Sent To Jail For Stealing Ride.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., April 17.—The vote at tomorrow's referendum will be a heavy one, as compared to that cast at the last election and plebiscite. The campaign closed Saturday night with comparatively small interest shown in the results, other than by the friends of prohibition. The wets had no public demonstrations, and the dries confined their activities purely to organization and canvass. Neither side brought in outsiders, and on the whole the campaign was remarkable for the outward indifference of the people as to whether the cellars were filled or not. The vote polled at the last election and plebiscite were 13,302 in favor of rural divisions and 7,414 in St. Thomas. There was a majority throughout the riding then of 25,490 against the four propositions offered, or too many negatives in favor of the dries, and in St. Thomas the majority against the wets was 9,104. These are the combined majorities and do not represent the individual vote as will be given tomorrow.
