Russia Is Not Safe.

Britain has found out that her at tempt to trade with Russia has been a failure. British politicians have themselves to blame, as they knew exactly what they were attempting to do.

Opening trade with Russia would amount to the Soviet being recognized by the world's greatest power, and the Soviet is a deeply-seated organization aimed at the overthrow of law and order all over the world.

Lloyd George sought by the sop of trade with Russia to buy freedom of India from Red propaganda. Lloyd George made the advance and got his fingers and his purse nipped in the Russian bear trap.

No Big Cabinet Men.

The calibre of the Meighen cabinet has not brought out much approval outside of the straight Conservative papers.

Praise, of course, was expected from these papers, but it has lacked the enthusiasm and warmth that come from positive conviction.

The Ottawa correspondent of the Financial Post, which paper is favorable to the present administration, points out that "Meighen failed to secure big cabinet men. It contains," continues the Post, "two or three men who might be put in the average class; but there is lacking any outstanding personality which would appeal to the country as a whole at a critical time like the present. It was hoped that Mr. Meighen would succeed in inducing some men of first-class business ability to strengthen his cabinet; but the big men of the business world in both parties seem very re luctant to enter politics."

The Post goes on with the suggestion that a number of outstanding men might be engaged in an advisory capacity, on the same plan that has been followed in Brit ain and United States.

This may work well in some cases but in others it simply adds to the deluge of commissions and of ordersin-council, and of legislation suggested or framed by men who have no mandate from the people.

The old idea of politics was that a Government set up its policy and was ready to stand or fall by it. There was something far more definite in that method than in the political merry-go-round on which


