FOUND GUILTY IN NORTH YORK IN LYONS CASE BY ACCLAMATION

of Manslaughter At Louise Leslie Trial.

Sentence Deferred a Week by Prime Minister Sends Message Justice Riddell After Commending Jurors.

TORONTO, Jan. 20 .- Mrs. Louise Leslie of London, Ont., was found guilty of manslaughter by the jury in the criminal assizes this after-

On hearing the verdict Mrs. Les lie threw her face forward and cried out: "Oh. my! Oh. my!"

Justice Riddell remarked to the jury that their verdict amounted to practically the same thing as if they had found the prisoner guilty of mur der. For had they done so, he said, he would have felt it necessary late to make representations for clemency, as there was no intention to kill.

The prisoner was remanded for a week. Accused had been tried on a charge of murder in connection with the death of Eileen Lyons, who died as a result of an illegal operation. In an impressive charge to the jury

Justice Riddell emphasized a section of the criminal code, which reads:

"If an offender for any unlawful object which he knows, or ought to have known, to be likely to cause death, and thereby kills any person. he is guilty of murder, even though he may have desired that his object should be effective without hurting

"Counsel for the defence had no right to ask you to consider that a verdict of guilty might mean the hangman's noose," said his lordship "Counsel had no right to appeal to you to take that into consideration.' Referring to Mr. W. K. Murphy's criticism of the police for permitting Urquhart and Collins to be at liberty, the bench pointed out that there was time yet to apprehend either of the men if this was found

necessary. Justice Riddell declared in the course of his charge that Urquhart, the dead girl's friend, was a criminal in the eyes of the law. "He should be convicted, and I hope he will be convicted," remarked the judge, "if you ask me anything."
