HOCKEY AND BASKETBALL
LOOM LARGE ONCE MORETentative Plans Will Be Made At Conference of Officials
This Week.

While a conference will be held this week between Dr. George Smith of Western University and A. E. Miller, president of the Western Ontario Schools Athletic Association, and Prof. N. C. Hart, secretary, as a preliminary to submitting a tentative program for the executive committee to be held in the program of last year which took up basketball, hockey and included interschool debating.

Rugby will not be included in the program this year, and it is doubtful if this game will ever come under the activities of the W.O.S.A. So many schools find it impossible to take up rugby that it leaves only a few of the larger cities to be touched, and these, such as St. Thomas, Brantford, Sarnia, Galt and Cheltenham, are either looked after by the interschool series of the O.R.F.U. or by leagues such as the Middlesex-Oxford.

However, the hockey and basketball series will be carried through, as both were an unqualified success last year both from the standpoint of giving interschool competition and the development of a better brand of play. The

PROBE DISINTEGRATION OF CEMENT STRUCTURES

OTTAWA, Sept. 11.—(By Canadian Press)—Millions of dollars worth of cement construction are involved in an important series of scientific experiments now under way. Examination has shown that cement structures, subject to the action of alkaline waters, particularly in the Western Provinces, are slowly disintegrating.

A committee of scientific experts, under the chairmanship of Professor C. K. Mackenzie of the University of Saskatchewan, was appointed to investigate and a fund was created to finance the work.

It is not expected, however, that any results of work done will be ready for publication for another year.

ARREST JEWELER FOR HAVING GOLD ILLEGALLY

TORONTO, Sept. 12.—Alleged to have had illegal possession of a large quantity of crushed gold ore taken from Timmins camp, L. Donnelly, manufacturing jeweler of Toronto, was arrested last night.

The police claim that Donnelly during the last few months had received from a certain man in the north country upwards of \$6,000 worth of gold.

Another arrest is expected in connection with the case.

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CHARGES TWO
WITH SLAYING

ST. CATHARINES, Sept. 11.—A coroner's jury at Thorold this afternoon found that Adam Solton came to his death on August 29 by knife wounds, inflicted at the hands of Harry Rutka, Nik Thomas and Nik Rutka. The two first named are awaiting trial at Welland jail on a charge of murder. Nik Rutka is still at large. Tony Solton, brother of the murdered man, who received seven severe wounds when he went to his brother's aid, was brought from the hospital and gave evidence today, charging both prisoners with complicity in the crime and identifying Nik Rutka's photo as that of the third assailant. All three had knives and used them, but Harry Rutka was named the chief cause of the trouble.

ONE KILLED; TWO HURT
IN SEAPLANE WRECK

VANCOUVER, Sept. 11.—Major C. MacLaurin, in charge of Canadian government air station here, is believed to be dead and two men, names as yet unknown, are badly injured in a seaplane wreck on the shores of Point Grey. The seaplane, piloted by Major MacLaurin, plunged into the mud, and he is said to be pinned underneath the machine, which is badly wrecked. The two injured men have been rushed to the hospital.

ASSERTS ONE MAY
BE TOO SCIENTIFIC

Col. McKeown Raps System Followed in Deciding Pensions For Soldiers.

OTTAWA, Sept. 11.—"It is possible to be too scientific," declared Col. Walter McKeown, the medical member of the royal commission investigating charges laid by the G. W. V. against the board of pensions commissioners at the sitting of the commission Saturday.

Col. McKeown was commenting on the fact that in the case of Private Edwin Munx, a Doctor Seton had declared that a diagnosis of tuberculosis had not been established, whereas the man had been a patient a year before in St. Agathe Sanatorium on that account. Col. McKeown suggested it must have been simply a mistake on the part of the doctor, but Dr. A. T. Bond of headquarters said that there were certain definite symptoms which they insisted on. Col. McKeown urged, however, that it was possible to be too scientific.

"It is like a person coming in and saying it is raining, but someone indoors remarks that it could not be as the barometer was set at fair." Difference in viewpoint was most marked, however, when the case of 477,390 Albert James Healey was under consideration. It had been shown that after a letter written by Dr. A. T. Bond of headquarters, deciding against the applicant, the file was marked to be put away, which, on Dr. Bond's admission, meant it would be sent to the central registry and only fresh evidence or pressure of some kind would bring that file to light again. C. Grant MacNeil, Dominion secretary of the G. W. V., secured this admission by a series of questions to Dr. Bond, the latter agreeing that it would be left to an outside organization, such as the Tuberculosis Veterans' Association or the G. W. V. A. to reopen his case. Dr. Bond said he understood that was what those associations were for.

18 DROWN WHEN TRUCK
GOES THROUGH BRIDGE

HOMERSVILLE, Ga., Sept. 11.—Eighteen negroes are believed to have drowned when a motor truck filled with fans en route to a baseball game plunged through a bridge. Fourteen bodies had been recovered tonight.

FORMALLY PROCLAIM
PALESTINE MANDATE

JERUSALEM, Sept. 11.—The British mandate for Palestine was formally proclaimed today. Sir Herbert Samuel, the high commissioner, assumed office and took the oath of allegiance.

At the behest of the Arabian and Christian communities the non-Jewish shops were closed and artisans abstained from work as an expression of protest.
