Better Late Than Never.

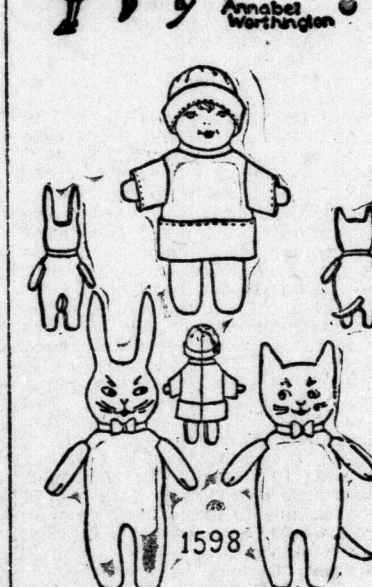

COMPUTE TOLL OF TERREBONNE FIRE

Officials Report No Lives Lost in Holocaust Which Swept Town.

Terrebonne, Que., Dec. 3.—(By Canadian Press)—One hundred and sixty-two houses destroyed, 800 persons homeless, 200 families more or less destitute, and damage amounting to between \$800,000 and \$1,000,000, is the toll, agreed upon by Mayor Labelle and Father Wilfrid Corbell, director of St. Louis College, as being about correct, of the fire which devastated this town Friday night and Saturday morning last.

No lives were lost, and the report that an elderly woman had succumbed to shock, and that a child had been burned to death is incorrect. Hundreds of refugees are being sheltered in St. Louis College, which is situated immediately beside the ash and cinder factory of Joseph Limoges, where the fire started Friday night. The fire started in a 50-mile-an-hour gale, was blowing away from the college is the only thing that saved it.

It was tag day today in Terrebonne, a generous harvest of silver and bills was collected for the sufferers. Mayor Labelle authorized the collectors at the toll bridge over the River Jesu to collect 50 cents instead of the customary 25 cents from every automobile entering the town.

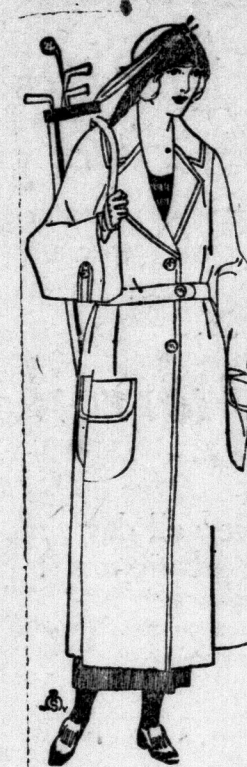
