

Finds Egypt's Secret; Strike Starts Fight; Adopt Men's Toggery



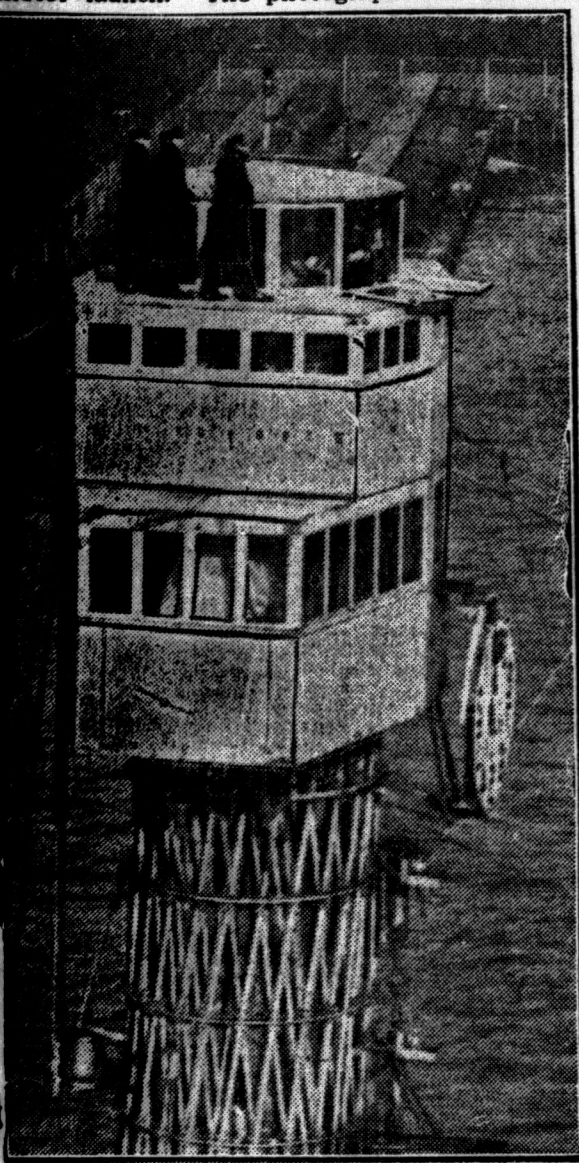

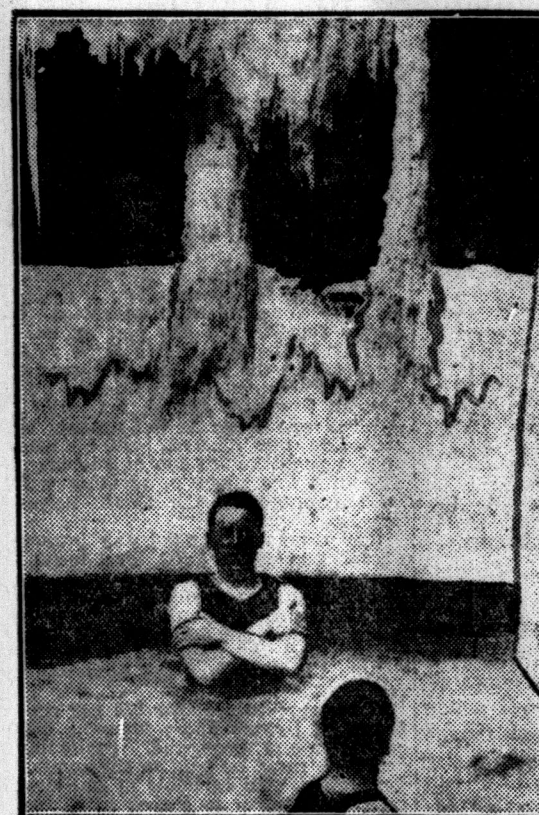

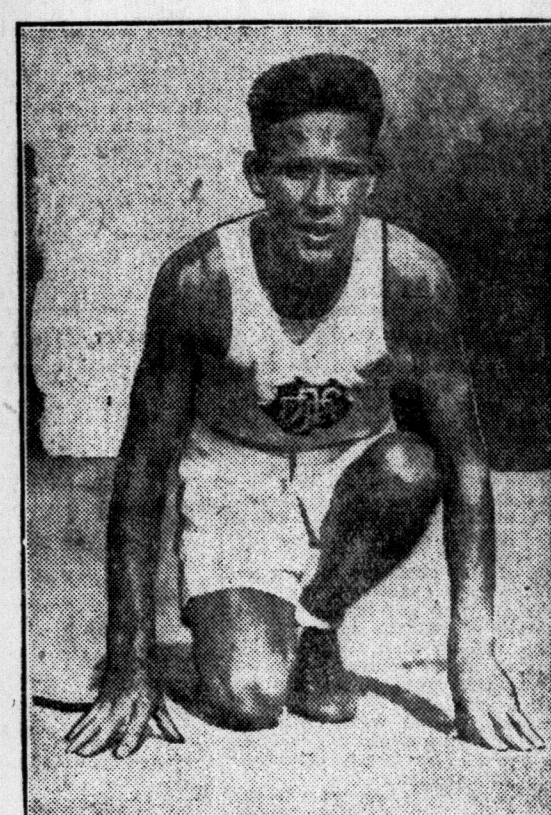
Above is shown Marshal Foch's new head-piece, made by hand of copper and silver. Surmounting it is the famous Gaulic cock, with its martial air

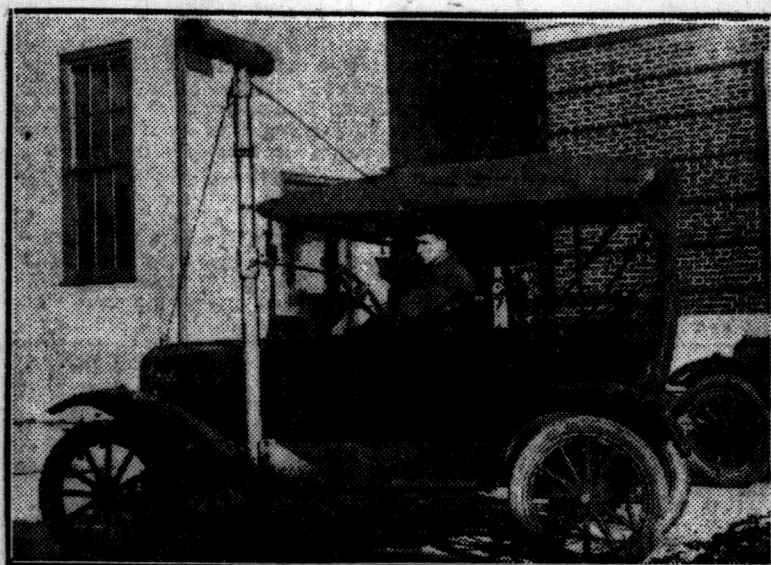
He has but one name—Tift. No, he never had another. His father, an old settler in New York, decided to let his son choose his own name himself, but the last name so pleased him that he never took another

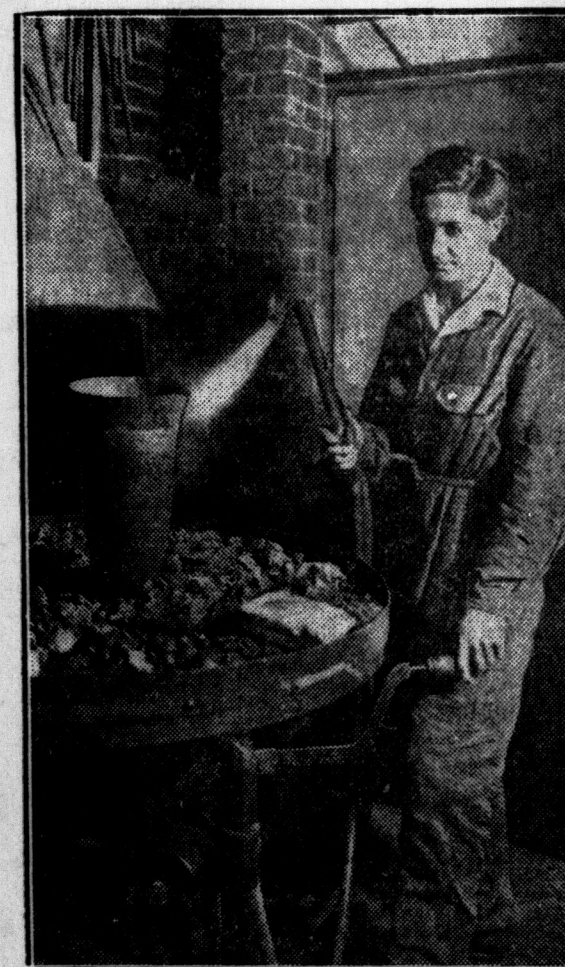

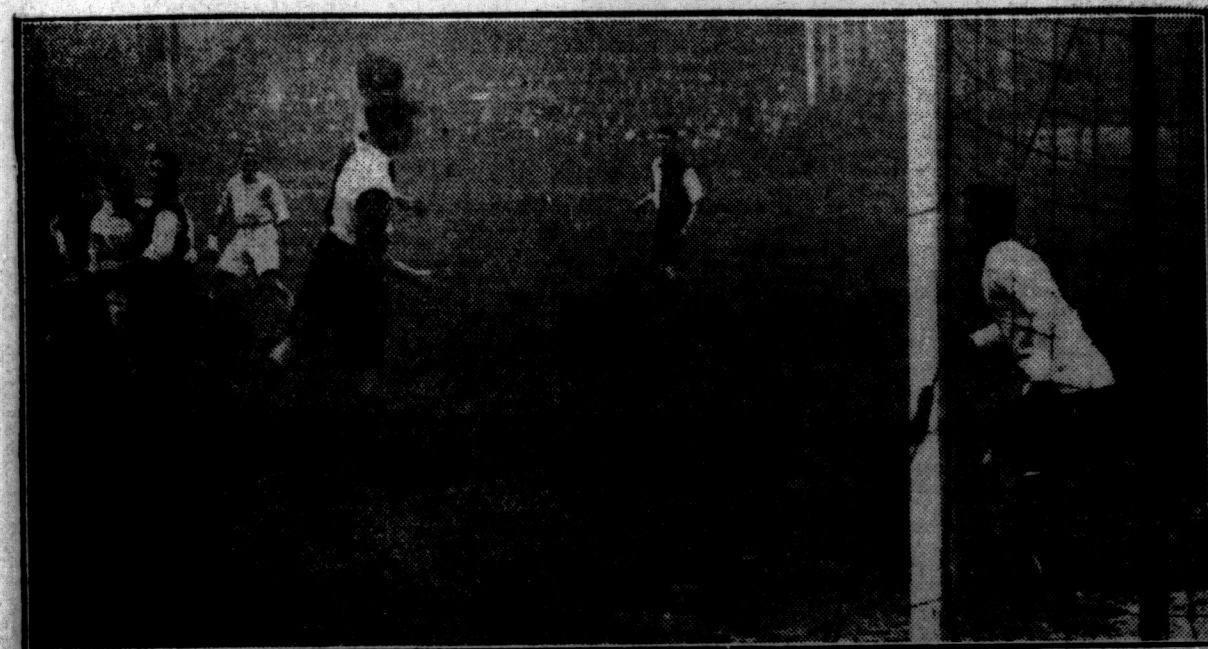
