for sending it by parcel post.

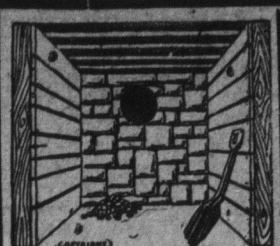
