TOWN COUNCIL MEETING TUESDAY

Some Trouble Over a Sewer in Union Street.—Building By-laws Again up

MORE TROUBLE

A meeting of the town council was held in the council chambers on Tuesday evening His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding. There were present councillors Miller, Quinn, White, Ferguson, Alexander, Ellis, Worth and Lunam.

The minutes of previous meeting was read and confirmed.

Communication read from Canadian Oil Co., offering road oil for use on the streets and referred to Public Property and Streets committee.

Communication read from Secretary of Canada Municipalities with program of subjects to be dealt with at the convention at Saskatoon in July.

Communication read from Superintendent Price of the I.C.R., relative to the request of the council for a deed of the subway and was referred to Town Solicitor.

Communication read from Mr. W. H. Wallace with reference to a sewer which was causing trouble in the basement of a house on Union Street. Councillor Alexander said that the Town Solicitor had had the matter in hands for some time, and was endeavoring to get the proprietors interested, sign an agreement regarding the right of way on the lane, and his department could do nothing till this deed was signed.

Mr. Wallace who was present and heard before the council said that he had offered the right of way for a nominal sum, and was sure the other proprietors would do the same. He said he had approached the Town Solicitor on the matter, but so far had seen no deeds to be signed which he was willing to do. The sewer could quite easily be put in the lane next to the rink.

The matter was then referred to the Town Solicitor.

Communication read from Town Clerk of Newcastle acknowledging receipt of resolution relative to an Interprovincial Highway passed by this council, the matter of sending delegates being left open. A similar letter was received from the Town Clerk of Dalhousie enclosing copy of resolution, and both letters ordered filed.

Communication from A. H. Reid Incinerator Co., with regard to garbage incinerator was ordered filed.

A communication was read from the Building Inspector asking instructions to deal with persons who had been notified to comply with the by-laws with regard to roofs within one month and had not done so. The inspector was instructed to take steps to enforce the law.

Petitions for trucking licenses were received from John Robertson, Geo. Main and Geo. Dunn, and auctioneer's license from L. T. Jou dry and referred to Police and License committee.

Petitions from residents on Pichette street, and also one from ratepayers on Hillside street for water and sewerage privileges were referred to Water and Sewerage committee.

The following reports from standing committees recommending payment of accounts were received and adopted. Councillor Quinn, Public Charities, \$80; Councillor Miller, Finance, \$677.15; Councillor Miller, Public Property and Streets, \$135.33; Councillor Alexander, Water and Sewerage, \$41.11. Councillor Lunam from Police and License committee recommended that Livery Stable licenses be granted Wm. Walker and John Tannier, and a license for two pool tables to A. Lacasse in accord-

GREAT INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION ALONG INTERNATIONAL R. R.

Large Shipments of Lumber, Ties, Cedar Posts, Shingles, Etc. Now Being Made All Along The Line.—Great Development in the Next Five Years

TOWNS SPRINGING UP

A few years ago a critic of the then local administration at Fredericton made the statement that the International railway was two streaks of rust extending from Campbellton toward the St. John river, through a country which would never be fit for settlement.

Last week a representative of the Graphic had the pleasure of making the trip from Campbellton to St. Leonard and the evidence of rapid development on every side was striking even to one who is constantly hearing of the progress being made along that line.

Along the International railway there are now two good sized towns, Richards, with about 500 inhabitants, has two large mills, one for long lumber the other for shingles, owned by the Richards Manufacturing Co., and a small mill owned by private parties which cuts logs for the settlers. A church has been erected as well as a school, hotel, and a number of well stocked stores.

Anderson with the adjoining village of Five Fingers have about 900 inhabitants. These two settlements will eventually be one town as they are hardly a mile apart and are growing toward each other. Here are also two saw mills, one at Five Fingers, owned by Pelletier and another at Anderson, owned by Faubert. A church, school, hotels, and a number of general stores with a number of good frame houses add to the appearance of the town.

To give our readers some idea of the work carried on along this railroad we have only to state that 2,700 cars of lumber were shipped over the International to St. Leonard and about 1,500 to Campbellton during the past season, and there are hundreds of cars of lumber, ties, shingles, etc. yet to be shipped.

All along the International settlers are going in and already many clearings are in evidence, with their little log shack amid the blackened stumps. In a few years these will be comfortable farms.

The settlers' most pressing need now is a good wagon road to join the settlements.

The railway authorities are taking notice with the By-laws. Report was received and adopted.

In reply to a question Councillor Miller said he had no further report to make re O'Leary Street.

Councillor White from Electric Light committee submitted report on the matter of placing meters in the temporary buildings in town and recommended that this be done at once. As a further endeavour is to be made to clear the shacks off Water Street this summer, the report was laid in the table.

In a further report Councillor White occasioned discussion on the matter of the upkeep of a horse for the use of the manager of the Electric Light Department. After the matter had been thrashed out it was finally resolved to allow the sum of \$75 per year on this account.

Councillor White craved the indulgence of the council to present a verbal report. Some time ago the Electric Light department had been authorized to get prices for a spare gas producer, and he desired to inform the council that the price of his firm, the same firm who had supplied the rest of the equipment would be \$5490. This sum was so preposterous that the matter was left in the hands of the committee for further report.

Councillor Ferguson from Fire Protection committee read a communication to him from the chief of the Fire Brigade who complained that Wm. Taylor had taken a 50 feet length of hose valued at \$62.50, for use on the sprinkling cart. This was the second time Taylor having done the same offence last year, and he felt that it was the duty of the council to censure an employee who was guilty of taking material from another department without permission.
