THE EASTERN TROUBLES.

TURKEY HOPES FOR A PRACEABLE The British Reserves Called Out-Particu-lars of Further Outrages—Lecting by English Soldiers — Eighty Bedouins

ALEXANDRIA, July 25 .- The Moniteur Egyptean re-appears here with the heading "Official Journal of the Government of the Khedive." It contains a proclamation dismissing Arabi from the ministry. The nspector of Cadastre at Tantah says: "I saw women there carrying tied to bludgeons dismembered arms and legs of massacred Europeans. The soldiers and rabble fought for loot. A Bedouin sheik with twenty Bedouins saved the inhabitants of the Jewish quarter and took them to the village. Another sheik saved myself and party. A meb from Alexandria murdered three employes of Cadastre with their families and urnt the bodies with petroleum. The mob killed twelve Greeks. The mob was repulsed eight times and finally two sheiks dispersed it." The khedive has despatched a vessel to Port Said to bring Cherif Pashs here. The military authorities are of the

Formidable preparations are being made around Rosetta by the rebels.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 25.—The conditions of the despatch of Turkish troops to Exypt will be discussed by the conference Wednesday. The porte hopes to obtain favorable terms which may lead to the prompt and peaceable solution of the Ecyptian question.

The payments so far have have been \$15,000,000, which is very heavy, and there is \$10,000,000 interest to be paid in a few days.
