Mr. Wilson of Seaforth has been to England in connection with his immense egg business, and while there informed the press that his firm last year handled no fewer than 33,600,000 eggs. Say hens on the average lay 100 eggs per annum, this means that it took 366,000 hens an entire year to lay this immense number, and this is but the out-put of one firm.
